Message from the Chief



As the Chief of Police, it is my pleasure to introduce you to the 2014 annual report for the Baker City Police Department. The thirteen men and four women, who make up our paid staff, are dedicated professionals with a sincere adoration for the community they serve. We hope that you find this report informative and that it will give you an insight into the service we provide to our community.

The Baker City Police Department (BCPD) is the only law enforcement agency within the 3088 square miles of Baker County to have 24 hour per day staffing, every day of the year. Our primary commitment to our community is to have patrol staff available to respond to the needs of our citizens at any time of the day or night.

This past year we restructured our staffing, in order to make a stronger commitment to Code Enforcement. We also saw our Reserve Program grow to six members and our Citizen on Patrol Program grow to ten members.

This coming year two of our top goals will be to focus stronger efforts on drug-related crimes and to continue addressing the various livability issues with diligent code enforcement.

We have been grateful of our supportive community throughout 2014 and are hopeful that 2015 will be another great year for our department and the community we serve.

The mission of the Baker City Police Department is to work in partnership with our community members, to actively promote the safety and welfare of our citizens, along with enriching their quality of life through the delivery of professional police services.

In 2014, staffing within the Baker City Police Department changed significantly, with the departure of one officer who moved to the Willamette Valley and three officers who left fulltime law enforcement altogether. Officer Gerrit Southard left our agency and moved to Sweet Home, so his young family could be closer to their extended family while Officer Sara Jury left fulltime law enforcement to explore other career options. Sergeant Josh Bryant retired and is now a private entrepreneur in the Boise area, while Detective Craig Davidson retired and is now in the private sector in Hawaii.

BCPD also temporarily lost Officer Wayne Chastain, who was deployed to Afghanistan as part of his role as a Command Sergeant Major in the Oregon National Guard.

Officer Rand Weaver continues to be the handler assigned to our department's drug detection canine Turbo. Turbo is in his 8th year of serving our community as a drug sniffing canine. With the passage of Measure 91, which has made recreational Marijuana legal, this will most likely be Turbo's last year of service for our community. We hope to continue the program with another dog that will not respond to the odor of Marijuana.



The Citizens On Patrol Program (C.O.P) started off the year strong collaborating with the Reserve Academy and training together in order to maximize resources, strengthen interagency communication and community policing efforts. The C.O.P team did not participate in the entire academy as the C.O.P program focuses on non-enforcement assistance. Therefore, the classes the team focused on were Introduction to Criminal Justice, Domestic Violence Recognition, Elder Abuse Recognition, Drug Abuse Recognition, & Ethics.

Foot Patrols were increased this year throughout Baker City.

The team participates in regular foot patrols in an effort to serve as extra eyes and ears and offer assistance to the Law Enforcement Officers. The feedback from the community has been very positive and the team has assisted in many ways in an ongoing endeavor to keep the community safe.

In addition to regular Foot Patrol, the Citizens On Patrol also played an active role in working with the local Fire Department and the Centers for Disease Control to conduct a community door-to-door survey during the Cryptosporidium

outbreak. This collaborative effort was vital to the process involved in gathering health information from citizens of our community. The C.O.P team involved in this collaborative effort collectively dedicated almost 200 hours in one week assisting the community.

The C.O.P team also participated in extra Foot Patrol during Miner’s Jubilee in July, as well as celebrated the Annual National Night Out against Alcohol, Drugs and Crime in August.

The program has grown in 2014 and we have added new team members, more training, more community services and more equipment as funds allow. This year we were able to secure a dedicated vehicle for sole use during C.O.P activities. The vehicle has also received special C.O.P identification and logos so that the vehicle may be easily spotted in the community and the differentiation made between the C.O.P vehicle and a Law Enforcement vehicle.

Toward the end of the year, the process, policies and procedures were developed for a new Elder Care Welfare Check program that will be starting in 2015. This new program will be a much needed addition to better serve the growing need throughout the Baker City community for regular health and safety checks of the Elderly in our community. This is just another way that the C.O.P Program will be working hard to better serve the citizens of Baker City. We are continuing to recruit new team members and increase training so that we may be prepared to move forward with our Emergency Preparedness plans in developing the “Zones” and community policing efforts throughout the city. 2014 marked another year in which the Baker City Police Reserve Officers contributed substantially to the overall mission of the Department. Even with the resignation of Reserve Officer Tyler Thamert due to new fulltime employment, the Department’s Reserve Corps expanded from four members to six. The expansion was due to the completion of the Eastern Oregon Reserve Officer Training Academy by three new Reserves.

Members of the Reserve Corps include: Reserve Commander Jerry Boyd, who coordinates the program, Reserve Officer III Dan Batchelor, and Reserve Officers II Matt Hearing, Ruthie Boyd, Justin Phlaum and Mark Powell.

Collectively the Reserves donated 2171 hours of service to the Department and the community. Reserve Officers supplement the work of fulltime Officers and on some occasions, in selected assignments, actually substitute, at no cost, for fulltime Officers saving the City a substantial amount in personnel costs. The dollar value of services rendered by Reserves in 2014 was in excess of \$51,000 based upon an entry-level fulltime Officers Salary, not including the value of fringe benefits.

The majority of hours donated were spent working patrol with Reserves riding as a second Officer in patrol units staffed by fulltime Officers. There were some assignments, however, that were staffed solely by Reserves. Those included:

- ✦ Security for mental holds at the hospital.
- ✦ Crime Scene security while warrants were obtained.
- ✦ Halloween trick or treat activity downtown.
- ✦ Christmas Parade.

In addition, Reserves assisted with the following incidents/activities during the year:

- ✦ SWAT callout on Cedar Street.
- ✦ Role players for Academy and SWAT training.
- ✦ Hells Canyon Motorcycle Rally.
- ✦ Miner’s Jubilee.
- ✦ Alcohol sales investigations at local establishments.
- ✦ Tip a Cop fundraiser.
- ✦ Shriner’s Parade and Football game.
- ✦ Reserve Information Night.
- ✦ Police facility maintenance.
- ✦ Assist Department’s Administrative Assistant with Bicycle Safety and Prescription Drug Drop Off activities.

Reserve Officers attend a monthly meeting/training and meet all mandated department training including First Aid/CPR, firearms, defensive tactics, and legal updates. During 2014 Reserve Officer Batchelor completed the Oregon Department of Public Safety Standards and Training Firearms Instructors Course and now provides all required firearms training/certification for Reserve Officers and assists as needed with training full time personnel.



Eastern Oregon Regional Reserve Police Academy

For the third consecutive year the Eastern Oregon Reserve Officer Academy, hosted by the Baker City Police Department, presented its training curriculum to new Reserve Officers and Deputies from throughout Eastern Oregon. The academy is supported by the Baker City Police Department, Baker County Sheriff’s Office, La Grande Police Department, Nyssa Police Department, and Union County Sheriff’s Office. Each of those agencies provided instructors to assist with the academy and each of those agencies had recruits attend and graduate from the 2014 Academy. In addition to Reserve Officers and Deputies members of the Baker City Police Department COPS Program (Citizens On Patrol) and dispatchers from Baker County Consolidated 9-1-1 Dispatch attended selected classes during the twenty week academy period.

Three Baker City Reserves completed the 200 hour academy and are now in the Department’s Field Training Program. Those three are: Ruthie Boyd, Justin Phlaum and Mark Powell. The Academy is coordinated by Baker City Reserve Commander Jerry Boyd. A number of Baker City Police Department personnel serve as academy instructors.

At the end of 2014, the NEO Regional SWAT Team is staffed by 28 operational members. Membership is comprised of personnel from four law enforcement agencies, two fire departments and one dispatch center. The participating agencies are the Baker City Police Department, Baker County Sheriff’s Office, La Grande Police department, Union County Sheriff’s Office, Baker City Fire Department, La Grande Fire Department, and Baker County Consolidated Dispatch.

There are three individual elements within the team structure. The elements are Tactical, TEMS (Tactical Emergency Medical Services) and CNT (Crisis Negotiations Team). The three elements collectively make up the SWAT and all fall under the same command structure.

NEO Regional SWAT has been operational for 2.5 years. This past year has been successful in terms of operational readiness, development and safety. The team has proven to be a viable and capable resource for each of the partnering agencies. The men and women offered to the team from our collective agencies continue to be our single most valuable asset. Our SWAT team members represent a collection of the most capable and experienced public safety employees from Baker and Union Counties.

The levels of cooperation and professionalism that we have seen from working together over the last 2.5 years is a direct reflection upon the leadership of the collective agencies. During this year, after much hard work and development, our team has achieved a status where we are now simply maintaining proficiency levels and enhancing capabilities.

In addition to assisting with the organizing of Community Night Out, Administrative Assistant Phoebe Wachtel helped staff the Baker City Rotary booth with Kari Borgen. This booth was devoted to teaching youngsters about bicycle safety.
- Chief Lohner participated in the [Career Fair at Baker Middle School](#). Approximately 70 students learned about police work.
- BCPD personnel, in conjunction with members of [Safe Kids Northeast Oregon](#), conducted a [Car Seat Clinic](#) at the Health Department.

COMMUNITY FUNCTIONS

- BCPD hosted Ms. Scott's 2nd grade class for a **Field Trip to the Department**. Officer Shannon Regan lead the students on a tour of the department including an opportunity to check out a patrol vehicle. - BCPD continues to provide **car seats to low income families**. These seats were purchased with funds received from an ODOT grant. During this grant cycle: 27 parents were educated on the proper fit of a car seat and a total of 11 seats were purchase through this program. In addition, 3 car seats presented for inspection did not meet standards due to missing labels, expiration seat and/or missing owner's manual.

- BCPD continued to partner with **New Hope for Animals of**

Eastern Oregon in administering the Trap-Neuter-Return program in Baker City. Multiple successful TNR's were completed, attending to 119 animals.

- BCPD received a donation of bicycle helmets given by the volunteers of **Baker Backpack Program** volunteers. These helmets were donated in support of La Grande school principal, Bruce Kevan who was seriously injured in a bicycling accident. This donation of helmets was in addition to the current helmet program supported by **Baker City Rotary, McElroy Printing, Hell's Canyon Rally, Hudson Printing and Oregon Trail Electric Co-Op**. During 2014, approximately 87 helmets were given to children.

- Administrative Assistant Phoebe Wachtel attended the **Safe Kids Oregon Annual Meeting** in Willsonville. She was recognized as a Safe Kids Hero for her contributions to Safe Kids of Northeast Oregon which include serving as the coalition's secretary and Buckle-Up Coordinator.



CODE ENFORCEMENT • • •

The mission of code enforcement is to promote community awareness and facilitate voluntary compliance with Baker City Municipal Codes to enhance the quality of life and foster civic pride.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

Crime prevention specialists know that property neglect sends a negative message which perpetuates further decay, lowers property values, and attracts the criminal element. Intervention through partnerships within the community, local law enforcement and fire safety officers, are a golden opportunity to build long-term relationships while educating residents, ensuring property code compliance, and helping individuals in need of assistance. We feel this is especially true today and this is reflected in our vision for code enforcement which is to optimize all available resources in order to foster positive relationships with Baker City's community residents and local businesses.

- ⊙ Complaints addressed involving property maintenance or nuisance affecting the public increased 13% over the previous calendar year.

Code Enforcement Priorities for 2014

- ⊙ Dispatched calls for service.
- ⊙ Address dangerous dogs cases and/or concerns.
- ⊙ Actively work property maintenance cases in high traffic and areas of known criminal activity within the city.
- ⊙ Other areas of focus:
 - Continue to follow up on older and/or chronic property maintenance cases.
 - Proactively address high visibility property maintenance cases.
 - Complete second-hand store compliance checks.
 - Proactively address bicycles/skateboards on Main Street and 1st Street where they are prohibited.

ANIMAL CONTROL

- 🐾 **65 Dog at Large citations** were issued, a 60% increase from 2013.
- 🐾 **4 Allowing a Dog to be a Nuisance (barking) citations** were issued.
- 🐾 **26 No Dog License citations** were issued.
- 🐾 **15 Other Animal Violations** were issued.
- 🐾 **600 dogs** were licensed citywide for the 2014 calendar year. In addition, **79 dogs** were licensed thru 2015 and **46 dogs** were licensed thru 2016. This was the second year that residents could purchase multi-year licenses.
- 🐾 **117 dogs were impounded**, a 26% decrease in dogs impounded from last year. Of the dogs impounded in 2014, 67% were claimed by an owner; 26% were adopted out; and 7% were euthanized as they were not adoptable or not claimed by an owner. 6 dogs impounded were required to be held on a rabies hold.
- 🐾 **8 livestock permits and 4 kennel permits** were issued. Kennel permits are required for any residence with more than 4 cats OR dogs.

WEED ABATEMENT

182 weed abatement complaints were addressed during 2014, an increase of 46% over the previous year. Within this total of weed abatement cases, 149 of the complaints came into compliance upon receipt of written notification from BCPD. Of the remaining non-compliant complaints, 8 were hired out to local contractors by Baker City at the expense of the property owner, 23 received a citation for failure to comply and two were pending at the conclusion of the season.



TRAINING • • •

Receiving quality, updated training is an extremely important facet of providing a competent law enforcement agency to the community they serve. Laws, and especially the interpretations of these laws, routinely change. Police tactics and best practice also routinely change as technology, weaponry and other various threats evolve in our society. In addition, police are required to complete certain amounts and types of training just to receive and maintain their certifications. These facts combine to make training one of the most critical needs we have.

(A variety of officer safety, OSHA and policy trainings are required each year which is in addition to the special trainings listed below.)

- ✦ Reserve Officer Daniel Batchelor attended Firearms Instructor Development Course training.
- ✦ Code Enforcement Officer Mark Powell attended *Verbal Excellence – Winning with Words* training presented by Captain Joe Puckett.
- ✦ Officer Coleton Smith attended Advance Roadside Impairment Driving Enforcement (ARIDE) training.
- ✦ Sergeant Dustin Newman attended *Internal Affairs Investigations* seminar and *Background Investigations for Police Applicants* training. Both trainings were sponsored by the Nampa Police Department.
- ✦ Officer Jared Wood attended *Trauma Informed Care Training*. This training was specifically tailored for professionals that interact with survivors of family violence.
- ✦ Sergeant Mike Regan, Sergeant Dustin Newman and Lieutenant Kirk McCormick attended *Officer Involved Incidents – From Every Angle* seminar. This training covered topics such as internal affairs, duty-related criminal conduct and vehicle crashes.

The community of Baker City is fortunate to harbor a very safe environment, free from many of the daily acts of violence that occur in larger communities and even in many smaller communities throughout our state and nation. However, that does not mean that we are completely void of violent acts, drug abuse or complicated fraud crimes.

Although our department is structured to have two investigators working as detectives, typically one of them is covering a patrol shift. That leaves one detective to handle the more serious cases and to conduct follow up investigations on the more complex cases originally assigned to patrol officers.

Our investigative efforts into drug related crimes are primarily addressed using officers on overtime shifts and in collaboration with personnel from the Baker County Sheriff's Office.

Our one full-time detective is an active member of the Baker County Major Crime Team, which is called upon to investigate most major felonies and other cases that require significant manpower throughout Baker County. Along with our detective, this team is comprised of members of the Oregon State Police and the Baker County Sheriff's Office.


Quality investigations are an expectation of our department and their success is clearly evident by the fact that rarely does a major crime's case ever go to trial in our community. Guilty plea agreements with the District Attorney's Office has become the standard for most of these cases, many resulting in extended prison sentences under ballot Measure 11 guidelines.

Some of the more notable cases investigated in 2014 included:

- an arrest of a Washington man for kidnapping.
- a domestic violence incident involving a firearm and shots fired.
- a multi-state fraud enterprise collaboratively investigated with the FBI and Washington state authorities.
- an arrest for Assault I after a Baker City man was stabbed multiple times.
- an arrest of a woman following a high-speed chase through town.
- an arrest of a woman for Animal Neglect and Initiating a False Report stemming from her statement given to authorities regarding how a dog in her care was injured.
- an arrest of a student at Baker Middle School for initiating a bomb threat.
- an arrest of a women for Child Neglect II after her child was found by officers at a busy intersection.
- a complex arson investigation where a Baker City man was burned in a structure fire.
- an arrest of a Baker City man for Luring a Minor and Online Sexual Corruption of a Minor.
- manhunt for a man who was wanted for Impersonating a Police Officer and Eluding a Police Officer in Baker City. The suspect was later arrested in Ontario.
- an arrest of a Baker City woman in a murder-for-hire conspiracy of her ex-boyfriend.
- an arrest of a Baker City man for custodial interference, whereas he transported his underage cousin across state lines and hid her from authorities.

CRIME RATES & POLICE STATISTICS • • •

Crime rates for the most part are cyclical and will vary based on numerous factors which relate to demographic and economic factors, but also, the criminal justice systems as a whole. Any breakdown in this system can have a startling impact on the type of crimes a particular community might encounter. An additional factor in small communities with low crime rates, such as Baker City, is “spree crimes”. One individual or group, participating in a criminal spree such as multiple burglaries committed in private homes or businesses, can greatly affect the statistics.

Notable statistics for 2014 reflect the following increases and/or decreases when compared with 2013:

- * **6% decrease** in overall citations were written in 2014. Citations issued for non-traffic offenses **increased 11%** for this time period. Citations issued for moving violations **decreased 15%** and citations issued for parking violations remained virtually unchanged for this time period.
- * Overall arrests reflected a very small increase, approximately 2% during the past year. Within this statistic, it was noted that warrant arrests had **increased by 20%**.
- * Traffic related arrests **increased by 16%** and noted within this statistic was an **increase of 38%** for DUII related offenses.
- * **27% increase** in motor vehicle accidents, not including hit and run. Within this statistic, overall hit and run incidents reported experienced a **32% increase**. Citations issued as a result of a motor vehicle accident reflected a **38% increase**.


