

## A message from the Chief

*Welcome to the Baker City Police Department annual report  
for 2009.*

Our Department serves the citizens and visitors of Baker City, located in Eastern Oregon at the foot of the Elkhorn Mountains. We are a full service, highly proficient organization serving a city of 10,000 residents. Baker City is also the largest city in Baker County, providing the majority of resources and services to the other 6,700 residents in our county.

As a destination point for recreation, we have year-round visitors in our community for camping, four wheeling, hunting, fishing, snow skiing, snowmobiling and many other outdoor activities.

The City of Baker City maintains its Western heritage, demonstrated by our authentic culture and epitomized by our Historic Downtown. Our Police Department is the only 24-hour law enforcement service in our county, which is 3,089 square miles in size.

Our services are provided by a dynamic group of people working at the City of Baker City and the Baker City Police Department. Our police department members are proud of the professional service they provide to our community. There have been a significant number of changes internally at the police department over the last three years with respect to personnel and the quality of service we provide to our community.



Quality of life factors have been an important focus for the police department during the last year.

I would like to take a look back on 2009 and provide you with an overview of various areas in our department.

## PERSONNEL

One very important accomplishment this past year was our ability to fill personnel vacancies and get all of our new officers through training. We were fortunate to fill several vacancies with experienced officers. Our 1 new recruit, successfully completed the 16 week academy and was honored with the most outstanding student award. Beginning in 2010 we have 15 fully trained sworn officers, still 1 below our desired strength with the loss of our School Resource Officer (SRO). Our hopes are to identify funding to reinstitute the SRO in the future.

This past year we also restructured our department, eliminating 1 supervisory position and adding back 1 investigations position. For the first time in approximately 5 years we have a full time member in the Baker County Narcotics Enforcement Team.

Our full time staff also includes 1 experienced community service officer, 1 part time evidence technician and 1 full time police receptionist (shared by 2 employees).

2009 saw our Citizen on Patrol (COP) Program expand from 2 volunteers up to 8. Our diverse group of citizen volunteers will be utilized for various department needs, focusing efforts this coming spring and summer with visibility patrols along our parkway and in our largest city park.

Our Chaplaincy Program had 1 new addition this year, bringing our total to 8 Chaplains. We have 6 Chaplains primarily serving the Baker City area and 2 other Chaplains who live in the Baker County pan handle. All of our Chaplains are classified as Public Safety Chaplains, serving the needs of police, fire/ems and dispatch.

Our Canine Drug Detection Program had a personnel change this year when our canine handler was called to active duty by the Oregon National Guard. A new handler, within the department, was identified and completed training. Unfortunately we effectively lost the program for two months, but now have a highly motivated, effective team.

## POLICIES & PROCEDURES

Having policies and procedures in place, before they are needed, is paramount to success. Three years ago our agency adopted the Lexipol policy manual and completed the editing for our department. Each year, as part of the service Lexipol provides, we receive two separate updates outlining changes in case law, state law and federal law. These updates ensure our agency retains an extremely comprehensive policy manual. This past year we completed those updates and also made further changes and additions specific to our department.

We also completed a comprehensive Line of Duty Death Manual, to include protocols covering actions from the time of the incident, through the funeral process and into the future with the survivor(s). Department members continued our work with Mental Health Professionals and School Officials on the School Threat Assessment Protocol. These protocols, which have now been effectively used, will help enable school officials and law enforcement to identify and assess potential threats in our school system.

With case law changes affecting DUII

investigations, our procedures had to be adapted to conform to the ever changing standards. Necessitated by those procedural changes we developed a search warrant template to be used by officers, which will help to streamline the new requirements.

To culminate our planning process, I began compiling information for a police services plan, which will be a guide to focus our efforts on specific department and community goals. That plan has been completed and will be implemented in 2010.



**Going beyond** the core function of a police department takes forward thinking, dedication and a sincere desire to raise the standard in your department and make your community a better place to live. The Baker City Police Department's progressive nature fosters an atmosphere to encourage positive change. Looking back on 2009 we were able to accomplish many feats to aid in the development of our department and enhance the safety and livability in our community.

## Interacting with the community in many other ways

### Special Events

The attractive nature of our community, along with the ambitious character of our citizens, leads to our city being the host of several major events each year. The Baker City Police Department has a pivotal role during these events, not only for the obvious safety and security reasons, but also by setting the tone for the visitors. Our officers are proud of their ability to maintain safety, while enabling a relaxed atmosphere our visitors and citizens can enjoy.



All sworn personnel assisted with the 2009 Hell's Canyon Rally, with an approximated 5,000 participants. One DUII arrest and one Tampering with Evidence arrest were the only rally associated arrests.

BCPD personnel assisted with the 2009 Elkhorn Classic stage race. CSO Regan facilitated a bike safety rodeo during this event for area youth and provided free bike helmets to those who needed them.

Most BCPD personnel were called upon to assist with the 2009 Miner's Jubilee, which was a community success.

Several BCPD personnel participated in the 2009 Relay for Life event, held at Baker High School. BCPD personnel organized and implemented a "Jail & Bail" fundraiser during the event, which was very successful.

BCPD personnel provided security at the 2009 Shrine parade and football game.

Several BCPD personnel participated in the 2009 National Night Out function held at our city park.

Department members greeted citizens and their children at the downtown Halloween event.

BCPD personnel participated in the national "Take 25" campaign, by going to pre-schools and fingerprinting children. This campaign, sponsored by the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children, encourages parents and guardians to take time on May 25<sup>th</sup> to teach their children safety.

Community Service Officer Regan assisted with a rabies/dog licensing clinic at the Fairgrounds. This service provides these licenses to our citizens at 50% of the normal cost.

Officer Regan is the sole Community Service Officer (CSO) for the Baker City Police Department.

Regan has been with the Baker City Police Department since 2001 and has completed Phase 1 and Phase 2 of the National Animal Control Academy.

# COMMUNITY SERVICE OFFICER

*Serving to meet the needs of citizens and animals alike*

Officer Regan is certified as an euthanasia technician and in field animal tranquilization.

The CSO position is responsible for a wide range of duties. Some of the duties include abandoned vehicles, weed violations, property maintenance enforcement, health and sanitation complaints, speed trailer deployment, parking enforcement and many other ordinance issues.

CSO Regan handles all animal related calls while on duty pertaining to: dogs at large, barking dogs, livestock complaints, kennel permits, exotic animal permits, assisting with investigations of animal abuse/neglect cases and educational outreach projects.

CSO Regan is responsible for assisting with annual rabies clinics for dog licensing and assist in creating ways to improve policies and procedures involving her position.

The CSO position works closely with the Planning and Building Department to assist, in a collaborative effort, with ordinance enforcement issues, specific to these divisions.

Officer Regan also participates in local Crime Prevention projects, educational presentations for students, business and citizens. She also assists with National Night out and other community events.

## ANIMAL CONTROL 2009

- ◆ **119 Animals** were Impounded
- ◆ **69%** of Impounded animals were claimed by an owner
- ◆ **17%** of Impounded animals were adopted
- ◆ **14%** of Impounded animals were put to sleep as they were not adoptable or claimed by an owner
- ◆ There were **518 dogs** licensed city wide

### Looking into the future

Efforts are underway to begin outreach and education for the Animal Control realm of CSO Regan's job. Increasing dog licensing city wide is the first task of the year by doing neighborhood canvassing to help inform and educate the citizens of Baker City about animal ordinances/laws and how to maintain healthy/safer pets by vaccinations, spay and neuter and dog licensing.

A strong continued effort will be placed on the enforcement of the Property Maintenance Code and systematic Zone Enforcement procedure. CSO Regan strives to fairly and effectively enforce City Ordinances and tries to meet the needs of all citizens and animals alike.

**Looking back through the 2009 year** CSO Regan has assisted with the task of writing and implementing a new Property Maintenance Ordinance, allowing the city to move forward with increasing the livability and beautification of the city. The property Maintenance Ordinance took just over six months to write and review and almost nine months to put into action. This ordinance was created in the public interest to encourage an attractive and safe physical environment for the benefit of all citizens. CSO Regan began a uniformed systematic code enforcement approach of utilizing zone maps to ensure that compliance efforts are checked and gained street by street, zone by zone.

CSO Regan became certified as an instructor for the Oregon Physical Abilities Test through the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training. This test is a physical ability/job sample test designed to evaluate police officer candidates interested in becoming patrol officers. CSO Regan facilitates the test for our agency and assists other Eastern Oregon agencies in administering the test to prospective hires.

# INVESTIGATIONS

*A very beneficial accomplishment this past year was when our investigations division returned to having two full time detectives. In 2005 the former chief created an additional supervisory position, effectively eliminating our second detective position. With the departure of one supervisor in 2009, we were afforded the opportunity to eliminate that position and add a second detective. That second detective primarily works narcotics enforcement as a member of the Baker County Narcotics Enforcement Team, while our other detective focuses efforts on person crimes and fraud investigations.*

*Our investigators also are members of the Baker County Major Crimes Team. This team is responsible for all major investigations county wide. Most typically these cases involve shootings and suspicious deaths.*

*Some of the cases our investigators initiated or assisted with from 2009 include:*

- ★ 24 Death Investigations in the city, all of which were determined to be either suicide or death from natural causes
- ★ 3 infant deaths in the city ruled accidental and 1 “shaken baby” death in the county resulting in the father receiving a 10 year prison sentence
- ★ 2 shooting investigations (other than suicide), 1 in the city and 1 in the county
- ★ Multiple sex abuse investigations; most notable was the culmination of a case involving a youth pastor who was sentenced to 199 months in prison
- ★ Multiple Fraud Investigations, several of which had Elder Abuse implications
- ★ Agency assist investigations, primarily with the Department of Human Services (Child Services Division)
- ★ Narcotics Investigations, to include large Marijuana Grow eradications
- ★ Child Porn Investigations
- ★ 1 incident which was classified as a Riot, with several individuals on parole returning to prison as a result of the incident
- ★ Organized car prowls (breaking into vehicles), which resulted in arrests and the return of a large quantity of stolen property
- ★ A burglary at the high school, resulting in several arrests and the return of several computers
- ★ 1 multi-state theft/fraud ring, resulting in 1 arrest thus far
- ★ Investigators also followed up on many cases, referred to them by patrol

## A Renewed Focus on Illegal Drugs

*Sharon Bass became the newest member of our investigations team, when she was transferred from patrol in November 2009.*

*Detective Bass is a 7 year veteran of the Baker City Police Department*

*and served 12 years prior with the Baker County Sheriff 's Department as a patrol deputy and corrections officer. Detective .*

*Bass brings to the investigations division a passion for narcotics enforcement, demonstrated by her tenacious efforts to hold offenders accountable when she was a patrol officer. In addition to drug enforcement and an assignment with the Narcotics Task Force, Detective Bass will work general crime investigations and participate as a member of the Baker County Major Crimes Team.*

## 2009 GRANTS

The Baker City Police Department, as with most public safety institutions, looks to grant opportunities in order to augment services. Unfortunately, most of the high dollar federal grants are appropriated on a “risk-based” priority. The low crime rate and low populations we enjoy in Baker City generally leaves us far short of meeting grant criteria. When funding was cut by the school district for our School Resource Officer, two competitive grants were submitted, with the hopes of retaining the vital position. Unfortunately, we were not selected by the Department of Education for a safe schools grant, submitted by our school district nor were we successful with our grant request through the Federal Community Oriented Policing Program. We were successful with several smaller grants, which include:

- ✦ Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) grant for car seats
- ✦ ODOT grant for Bike Helmets
- ✦ Commission for Children and Families grant for a secure Interview Room
- ✦ Federal Recovery Act grant to purchase new ballistic vests

## OTHER DEPARTMENT PROJECTS & ADDITIONS



Police Receptionist Tyra Ruberti culminated nearly a year of preparation when the 2009 Canine Classic Golf Tournament was successfully completed. This tournament is the primary fund raiser for our Drug Dog Detection Program.



Our traffic safety efforts have been enhanced with the selection of Officer Erik Plaza as our Traffic Safety Coordinator and by implementing our Motorcycle Patrol Unit. Officer Wayne Bailey and Officer Josh Bryant will be patrolling, as staffing levels permit, on motorcycles with an emphasis on traffic and pedestrian safety.

Utilizing a grant through the Commission on Children and Families, a second interview room was completed. This provides complete separation of juvenile and adult offenders, along with allowing a “secure” setting for suspect interviews.

I completed our 2010 training schedule to ensure all mandated, and high risk, training topics are covered.

## DRUG INTERDICTIONS

Disrupting the flow of narcotics, along with apprehending those responsible, remains a department priority. With the use of our drug detecting canine, our abilities to accomplish this are greatly enhanced. This past year we had several low level interdictions in our city. The most significant interdiction was when Officer Mike Harris conducted a traffic stop on Campbell Street, requested the assistance of our drug dog Turbo, and ultimately seized Ketamine, Marijuana, several thousand dollars cash and a 2002 Honda passenger car. The suspect arrested was from Salt Lake City, Utah.

This drug interdiction resulted in nearly \$4,000 being forfeited to the city along with the automobile. Out of the \$4,000, the drug dog program retained \$1,145 after the statutory split. The vehicle was sold for \$2,010 and the drug dog program retained \$722.40, after the statutory split.

# TRAINING

**Training is one of the most important** functions a police department must maintain. Along with minimum training requirements from our Public Safety Academy, in order for officers to maintain their certification, changes to case law governing protocols require constant training. Areas encompassing perishable skills developed with regard to use of force, defensive tactics and other high risk acts also require consistent high level training.



## **OSHA (Occupational Safety and Health Administration)**

trainings and other policy mandated trainings are also included in our annual training schedule. If these trainings are not maintained, the safety of our officers, community members and visitors is jeopardized. Failure to properly train also creates an opening for criminal and civil li-

ability.

In addition to the required trainings, we attempt to send officers to other trainings also. These trainings are advantageous to the development of the officer, while providing the department and community with a better overall officer. Officers who have particular interests, such as drug interdiction or investigations, can also receive specialized training that

that most police departments in our State do not face. Travel time, and other associated costs, is far greater for Eastern Oregon Law Enforcement agencies than what it is for those in the Willamette Valley. Most training seminars in Oregon are either taught at the Academy in Salem, or hosted by the larger departments on the I-5 corridor. This necessitates we maintain in-house in-


**Fortunately, our department has several in-house instructors, who are able to provide many of the needed and required trainings. Our staff of instructors includes:**

# CRIME RATES & POLICE STATISTICS


**Crime rates** for the most part are cyclical and will vary based on numerous factors. While police play a pivotal role in crime rates, we are only part of the equation, as we are only one part of the criminal justice system. A system which consists of the District Attorney who prosecutes cases, Judges who preside over the Hearings and Trials, Jury 's and Judges who determine guilt, Jails and Prisons which house the offenders, Treatment Providers who assist the offenders and Parole and Probation Officers who supervise the offenders when they are released. Each piece of the system is critical and any breakdown can affect crime rates.

**Of course** there are many other factors from economic to demographic, which also play a large role in crime rates. An additional factor in small communities with low crime rates, such as Baker City, is "spree crimes". One individual or group, which goes on a spree and for example breaks into cars or houses or businesses, can greatly affect the statistics.

**In Baker City** we saw the overall crime rate decline in 2009, from 2008 numbers, evident by a 12% reduction in criminal reports. This is in large part due to our entire criminal justice system in Baker City. All of the various elements are not only well trained, competent and committed, but also work extremely well together. Our community is very fortunate to be afforded this service and the Baker City Police Department is proud to be an integral part of this cooperative system.

**Traffic safety** efforts were made a priority this past year, focusing on education, compliance and enforcement. Our radar trailer was used in several sections of town to remind motorists of speeds, while staff provided various other educational efforts to the community. Compliance efforts were enhanced this past year, evident by a 54% increase in warnings for traffic violations. Enforcement efforts were also up in 2009 with a 72% increase in citations for traffic violations.


