## Annual Report 2010

A review of the most relevant facts related to our local law enforcement agency

### Welcome to the Baker City Police Department annual report for 2010.

Our Department serves the citizens and visitors of Baker City, located in an Eastern Oregon valley between the Elkhorn and Wallowa Mountains. We are a full service, highly skilled organization serving a city of 10,000 residents. Baker City is the largest city in Baker County, providing the majority of resources and services to the other 6,700 residents in our county. As a destination point for recreation, we have year-round visitors in our community for camping, hiking, four wheeling, hunting, fishing, snow skiing, snowmobiling and many other outdoor activities. The City of Baker City maintains its Western heritage, demonstrated by our authentic traditional culture and epitomized by our friendly, caring residents. Our Police Department is the only 24-hour law enforcement service in our county, which is 3,089 square miles in size. Our services are provided by a vibrant group of people working at the City of Baker City and the Baker City Police Department. Our police department members are proud of the professional service they provide to our community. Our department is committed to continually seek ways to improve our abilities, efficiency, productivity and overall quality of service to our community.

## CHAPLAINCY PROGRAM

Our Chaplaincy Program currently stands at seven strong. We have six Chaplains primarily serving the Baker City area and one other Chaplain who lives in the Baker County pan handle. All of our Chaplains are classified as Public Safety Chaplains; serving the needs of police, fire, E.M.S. and dispatch. This past year they were invaluable, assisting our department with death notifications, providing counseling to officers and assisting the state police with highway traffic crashes.

## CITIZEN ON PATROL PROGRAM

This past year our Citizen on Patrol (COP) Program replaced three volunteers, leaving our total at seven. Our diverse group of citizen volunteers has proven valuable assisting with reception work at the police station. They will continue to be utilized for various department needs, with a goal of focusing their efforts this coming spring and summer to visibility patrols along our parkway and in our largest city park.

## The men and women who serve

2010 proved to be a challenging year for personnel management within the Baker City Police Department. Budget reductions dropped our sworn officer total to fourteen and reduced our civilian staffing to two. In addition we also lost one of our most valued employees when Sergeant Beth Yeaton retired after twelve years of service. Our department will miss her leadership, loyalty and dedication. As expected, the personnel reductions had several consequences. However, our staff has worked hard to mitigate them and reduce the impact on our community.

The most noticeable impact resulted in our front office being closed about one half of the time, due to the loss of a part time civilian position that was primarily responsible for working as the police receptionist. Our evidence technician, who also had been assisting at the front desk, continues to spend a portion of her time assisting citizens in the front office and handling the clerical responsibilities. We have also been fortunate enough to occasionally utilize citizen volunteers to answer telephones and greet citizens.

The biggest impact to our community safety efforts occurred when we had to re-assign our drug detective to patrol this past August. With no overlap patrol staffing, and the loss of an officer, we were left with few options to ensure patrol coverage. Although our efforts to proactively investigate drug activity were greatly hampered during this time, we remained committed to attacking illegal drug activity whenever possible. We were pleased to return our drug detective to her role in late December when our newest officer, who was hired already having his police certification, was released from field training and assigned to patrol.

Internally, our greatest challenge for 2010 has been operating with only three supervisors, since the retirement of Sergeant Yeaton. Although we do have a fourth supervisory position budgeted, we have left that position unfilled at this point to avoid impacting patrol. When our recruit who is currently attending the police academy has graduated and completed field training this coming spring, we will work to fill that open position from within.

Although our three current supervisors have absorbed the majority of the additional duties, some tasks and several department projects have been placed on hold.

In 2010 our City Council established a list of priorities, two of which were directly related to police efforts. Code enforcement and having an officer presence in our schools were listed as priorities by our current council, both of which have also been department goals. With a reduction in staffing and no grant dollars available, there was only one way to accomplish both priorities. So in August we reclassified our civilian code enforcement/community service officer position to a sworn (full police powers) position. That position will now be responsible for not only code enforcement and community service, but also school resource.

## Policies & Procedures

Having policies and procedures in place, before they are needed, is paramount to success. Four years ago our agency adopted the Lexipol policy manual and completed the editing for our department. Each year, as part of the service Lexipol provides, we receive two separate updates outlining changes in case law, state law and federal law. These updates ensure our agency retains an extremely comprehensive policy manual. This past year we completed those updates and in addition made further changes and additions specific to our department.

One of the biggest policy/operational changes this year occurred when we added Taser's to our use of force options. For several years now we have been evaluating the Taser and its value to our department and community. This year it became evident that the Taser could potentially reduce the risk of injury to our officers and citizens, so we purchased three of them. We adopted the Lexipol Taser policy and completed our mandatory training.

## K9 DRUG DETENTION

Our Canine Drug Detection Program had another personnel change this year when our canine handler moved out of Baker City. A new handler, within the department, was identified and completed training. Officer Rand Weaver, a fifteen year police veteran and five year member of our department has teamed up with Turbo to serve our community.

## DRUG INTERDICTIONS

Disrupting the flow of narcotics, along with apprehending those responsible, remains a department priority. With the use of our drug detecting canine, our abilities to accomplish this are greatly enhanced. This past year we had several low level interdictions in our city. The most significant interdiction was when Officer Mike Harris and our drug dog Turbo responded to assist the Oregon State Police on Interstate 84. The deployment of Turbo, and subsequent search, resulted in the seizure of 1.45 pounds of Marijuana, 1.7 grams of Cocaine, trace amounts of Heroin and 116 pills.

Turbo is now with his third handler and hoping for a greater use in 2010. Our department goal will be to utilize Turbo in a more proactive manner with targeted interdictions.

# Special Events

## Interacting with the community in many other ways



The attractive nature of our community, along with the ambitious character of our citizens, leads to our city being the host of several major events each year. The Baker City Police Department has a pivotal role during these events, not only for the obvious safety and security reasons, but also by setting the tone for the visitors. Our officers are proud of their ability to maintain safety, while enabling a relaxed atmosphere our visitors and citizens can enjoy.

Going beyond the core function of a police department takes forward thinking, dedication and a sincere desire to raise the standard in your department and make your community a better place to live. The Baker City Police Department's progressive nature fosters an atmosphere to encourage positive change. Looking back on 2010 we were able to accomplish many achievements to aid in the development of our department and enhance the safety and livability in our community.

### Some of the events and functions our staff assisted with were:

- ✧ BCPD personnel assisted with our local museum's fundraising event, **A Night Out at Old Auburn**, which brought the persona of the old west back to our community.
- ✧ BCPD personnel were called upon to assist with the **2010 Miner's Jubilee**, which was a community success.
- ✧ Community Service Officer Regan assisted with a **rabies/dog licensing** clinic at the Fairgrounds. This service provides these licenses to our citizens at 50% of the normal cost.
- ✧ BCPD personnel provided security at the **2010 Shrine** parade and football game.
- ✧ BCPD personnel, in cooperation with our local hospital, conducted a **"Drug Take Back"**. Numerous pharmaceuticals were secured from citizens with an estimated street value of \$5,537.
- ✧ Several BCPD personnel participated in the **2010 National Night Out** function held at our city park.
- ✧ All sworn personnel assisted with the 2010 **Hell's Canyon Rally** (<http://www.hellscanyonrally.com>), with an approximated 6,000 participants. There were no rally associated arrests.
- ✧ Department members greeted citizens and their children at the downtown **Halloween** event.
- ✧ BCPD personnel assisted the Commission on Children and Families with **Red Ribbon Week**. Each year our officers hand out "goody bags" to children in the community who have pledged to stay drug free.
- ✧ BCPD personnel assisted with the **2010 Elkhorn Classic** (<http://www.elkhornclassic.com>) stage race. During this event, the BCPD also provided free bike helmets to children and other citizens along with registering bicycles.
- ✧ BCPD Personnel participated in the national **"Take 25"** campaign. This campaign, sponsored by the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children, encourages parents and guardians to take time on May 25<sup>th</sup> to teach their children safety.

# Community Services

## Other community service functions

I delivered a "Women's Safety" presentation to our local Soroptimist organization.

BCPD provided a response protocol and safety presentation to our local bank managers.

I delivered a "Bullying" presentation to our local 6<sup>th</sup> grade students.

Officers provided security for the OSAA 1A State Basketball Championships, held at Baker High School. The City is reimbursed \$1,000 by OSAA for this service.

Community Service Officer Regan delivered an "Animal Safety" presentation to our local 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students.

BCPD personnel assisted with the starting of the local Easter Egg Hunt, which is held annually in our largest city park.

BCPD delivered a site specific safety presentation to our local Community Bank staff.

BCPD provided security to both of our US Senators, during visits to Baker City.

Sergeant Mike Regan delivered a presentation to the Baker City Shuffle Board Club.

BCPD participated in an emergency preparedness drill with executives from Blue Mountain Community College.

I conducted a security check / threat assessment for our local Department of Motor Vehicles.

I spoke to the Shrine organization's Law Enforcement group, giving them an update on our community and police services.

Evidence Technician / Receptionist Valeria Hysong participated in two car seat clinics, teaching local parents how to properly install car seats.


BCPD continues to provide car seats to low income community members, purchased with funds from an ODOT grant. A total of 79 car seats were inspected during 2010.

BCPD created space in our police facility and invited in the Baker County Justice Court staff, who were forced to leave the courthouse after extensive water damage to the facility.

BCPD participated in the 2011 Muscular Dystrophy "Lock Up", an annual event that is held to raise funds for local children affected by that disease.

BCPD partnered with the Salvation Army and hosted an Angel Tree and a food barrel.

Three of our Citizen on Patrol (COP) members, provided security to a Porsche Club visiting Baker City.



## GRANTS RECEIVED IN 2010

The Baker City Police Department, as with most public safety institutions, looks to grant opportunities in order to augment services. Unfortunately, most of the high dollar federal grants are appropriated on a “risk-based” priority. The low crime rate and low populations we enjoy in Baker City generally leaves us far short of meeting grant criteria. In an attempt to restore our School Resource Officer, we re-submitted our grant request through the federal Community Oriented Policing program. Once again we were denied funds to re-establish the program. We were successful with several smaller grants, which include:

- ❖ Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) grant for car seats
- ❖ ODOT grant for Bike Helmets
- ❖ Foundation grant for maintenance of our Drug Dog Detection Program

## Other Department Projects & Additions

- ❖ Evidence Technician / Receptionist Valeria Hysong culminated nearly a year of preparation when the 2010 Canine Classic Golf Tournament was successfully completed. This tournament has been the primary fund raiser for our Canine Drug Detection Program.
- ❖ BCPD has partnered with Baker County Emergency Management to identify the “Vulnerable Populations” in our community, and then ways to contact them in the event of an emergency.
- ❖ BCPD completed the purging process of decades worth of old police reports and other records.
- ❖ BCPD developed an “Active Shooter Response Protocol” for Baker High School and Baker Middle School. This power point training was then provided to all of our staff, along with deputies from the Baker County Sheriff’s Office and Troopers from the Oregon State Police. A drill was then conducted at Baker High School.
- ❖ I organized and facilitated a law enforcement specific meeting with US Senator Ron Wyden, allowing a venue for Eastern Oregon Law Enforcement Executives to relay various concerns to the Senator and his staff.
- ❖ BCPD developed and implemented a new website, [www.bakercitypolice.com](http://www.bakercitypolice.com), in an effort to communicate with our citizens in a more effective manner
- ❖ BCPD has partnered with an organization called “A Child is Missing”, which will provide our department with another resource to help locate missing children and other missing people.
- ❖ I completed our 2011 training schedule to ensure all mandated, and high risk, training topics are covered.



**Training is one of the most important functions a police department** must maintain and work at improving. Along with minimum training requirements from our Public Safety Academy, which are required for officers to maintain their certification, changes to case law governing protocols require constant training. Areas encompassing perishable skills developed with regard to use of force, defensive tactics and other high risk acts also require consistent high level training.

OSHA trainings and other policy mandated trainings are also included in our annual training schedule. If these trainings are not maintained, the safety of our officers, community members and visitors is jeopardized. Failure to properly train also creates an opening for criminal and civil liability.

In addition to the required trainings, we attempt to send officers to other trainings also. These trainings are advantageous to the development of the officer, while providing the department and community with a better overall officer. Officers who have particular interests, such as drug interdiction or investigations, can also receive specialized training that will help them to excel even farther.

Unfortunately our location in Oregon adds an economic factor into training that most police departments in our State do not face. Travel time, and other associated costs, is far greater for Eastern Oregon Law Enforcement agencies than what it is for those in the Willamette Valley. Most training seminars in Oregon are either taught at the Academy in Salem, or hosted by the larger departments on the I-5 corridor. This necessitates we maintain in-house instructors, to help reduce that economic impact, and maintain budget allocations for trainings.

Fortunately, our department has several in-house instructors, who are able to provide many of the needed and required trainings. Our staff of instructors includes:

- Firearms/Range Instructors (Handgun and Rifle)
- Impact Munitions Instructor (Bean Bag Shotgun)
- Defensive Tactics Instructors (Counter Assault, Handcuffing, Control Holds, etc.)
- Defensive Aerosol Instructors (Pepper Spray)
- Confrontational Simulations Instructors (Hand to Hand Fighting, Groundfighting, Vehicle Stops, etc.)
- Weapons Simmunitions Instructors
- Domestic Violence Instructors
- Standardized Field Sobriety administration Instructor

# Investigations

## FOCUSING ON ILLEGAL DRUGS

Sharon Bass became the newest member of our investigations team, when she was transferred from patrol in November 2009. Detective Bass's passion and determination working these cases led to several major arrests and drug seizures. Detective Bass participated in two multi-county investigations with BCNET, resulting in numerous arrests throughout three counties. Both of these investigations targeted individuals who supplied drugs to Baker City. As mentioned previously, we were forced to reassign Detective Bass for several months, but are pleased she is back working investigations. It will take her time to make up lost ground, but I am confident Detective Bass will make great strides.

The Baker City Police Department is very fortunate to have two experienced, motivated and exceptionally gifted investigators. Both of our detectives are involved in nearly all major crimes in our community, and are members of the Baker County Major Crimes Team. However, our detectives do have specialties. Detective Jay Lohner focuses on person crimes such as sex abuse, child abuse and assaults, while Detective Sharon Bass has a primary mission associated with illegal narcotics. Detective Bass is also a member of the Baker County Narcotics Enforcement Team (BCNET).

## Some of the cases our investigators initiated or assisted with from 2010 include

- ✦ 29 death investigations in the city, all of which were determined to be either suicide or death from natural causes
- ✦ 1 murder
- ✦ 1 attempted murder
- ✦ 2 kidnappings, which were determined to be unfounded, resulting in the reported victim being arrested for false reporting
- ✦ 3 business burglaries which were proven to be related, resulting in arrests
- ✦ Multiple sex abuse investigations
- ✦ Multiple Fraud Investigations
- ✦ Agency assist investigations, primarily with the Department of Human Services (Child Services Division)
- ✦ Narcotics Investigations, to include two multi-county investigations
- ✦ Organized car prowls (breaking into vehicles), which resulted in arrests and the return of a large quantity of stolen property
- ✦ Vandalism at Baker High School, resulting in several arrests of students from La Grande High School
- ✦ Investigators also followed up on many cases, referred to them by patrol

*This past year our community sadly had its first murder in five years, along with an attempted murder in a separate incident. Both of these cases were family related and had an impact on many of the citizens in our community.*

# Crime Rates & Police Statistics



Crime rates for the most part are cyclical and will vary based on numerous factors. While police play a pivotal role in crime rates, we are only part of the equation, as we are only one part of the criminal justice system. A system which consists of the District Attorney who prosecutes cases, Judges who preside over the Hearings and Trials, Jury's and Judges who determine guilt, Jails and Prisons which house the offenders, Treatment Providers who assist the offenders and Parole and Probation Officers who supervise the offenders when

they are released. Each piece of the system is critical and any breakdown can affect crime rates. Of course there are many other factors from economic to demographic, which also play a large role in crime rates. An additional factor in small communities with low crime rates, such as Baker City, is "spree crimes". One individual or group, which goes on a spree and for example breaks into cars or houses or businesses, can greatly affect the statistics.


In Baker City the overall crime rate stayed virtually unchanged in 2010, when comparing the criminal reports taken in 2010 to 2009 numbers. Our community is still very fortunate to not have organized gangs residing in our city. We take pride in that fact, but realize that as overall gang numbers increase nationwide and in our region, it will become increasingly more challenging to deter gang activity.

In 2009 traffic safety efforts were made a priority, focusing on education, compliance and enforcement. Those efforts were rewarded in 2010 with a 23% reduction in crash reports. Citations issued for traffic violations were down 12% in 2010, while traffic warnings issued rose slightly.

## CODE ENFORCEMENT

- ▶ There were **649 dogs licensed** city wide (an increase of 25% compared to 2009)
- ▶ To benefit our community, the **Animal Clinic**, which is the City impound facility, also issued dog licenses this year
- ▶ **128 animals were impounded**: 68% were claimed by an owner; 23% were adopted; 11% were euthanized as they were not adoptable or not claimed by an owner
- ▶ **99 complaints of weed abatement** were addressed, being the highest number of complaints since 2007
- ▶ In September of 2010 a new **Property Maintenance Ordinance** was adopted and put into use. **Sixteen properties** were identified and started the compliance process under the new ordinance. BCPD received its first court order for abatement, which was completed in 2010


