Annual Report for 2011

-Our Department serves the citizens and visitors of Baker City located in rural Eastern Oregon. At approximately 10,000 residents, Baker City is the largest city in Baker County, providing the majority of resources and services to the other 6,700 residents in our county. Our Police Department is the only law enforcement agency with 24-hour per day staffing in our county, which encompasses 3,089 square miles. Our services are provided by a dedicated team of officers working for the Baker City Police Department (BCPD). We are proud of the professional service provided to our community and we are committed to continually seek ways of improving our abilities, efficiency, productivity and overall quality of service to our community. I would like to take a look back on 2011 and provide you with an overview of various areas in our department.

CHAPLAINCY PROGRAM

Our Chaplaincy Program currently stands at six strong. We have five Chaplains primarily serving the Baker City area and one other Chaplain who lives in the Baker County panhandle. All of our Chaplains are classified as Public Safety Chaplains; serving the needs of police, fire, EMS and dispatch. This past year they were invaluable, assisting our department with death notifications, providing counseling to officers and assisting the state police with highway traffic crashes.

CITIZEN ON PATROL PROGRAM


This past year our Citizen on Patrol (COP) Program lost three volunteers, leaving our total at four. Our diverse group of citizen volunteers will continue to be utilized for various department needs, with a goal of focusing their efforts this coming spring and summer to visibility patrols along our parkway and in our largest city park. COP members will also be assisting with traffic safety by placing the radar trailer in various locations around our community.

The men and women who serve



In January of 2011, two BCPD officers graduated from the basic police academy. Officer Gerrit Southard finished with the highest academic average in his academy class, earning him the BOWN Award. Officer Southard has gone on to complete his field training and is proving to be a hardworking, dedicated officer.

Officer Shannon Regan also graduated from the academy, receiving numerous accolades for her response in simulated scenarios. Officer Regan had been a civilian employee with BCPD for ten years, primarily working code enforcement, up until her position was reclassified. Once she completed her field training, Officer Regan began working as a School Resource Officer. Returning an officer to the high school after an 18-month absence has proven to be extremely valuable and Officer Regan's persistent, conscientious nature made her a perfect fit for the assignment. In addition to her work as a School Resource Officer, Officer Regan handles code enforcement duties. Officer Regan is certified through NACA (National Animal Control Association) and is trained in wild, domestic and exotic animal captures. She is also trained to perform animal euthanasia and is the only certified person in the department to perform chemical immobilization of animals.



Staffing shortages during the summer months necessitated that Officer Regan cover patrol shifts while we called on the services of a past employee, Jodie Averett, to take on the bulk of the code enforcement responsibilities. Officer Averett was only able to work part-time, which meant that our patrol staff had to also assume many of those duties.

As the year came to an end, BCPD was in the process of filling two vacancies. The second vacancy was created when Erik Plaza resigned, so he and his wife could begin new careers in the Willamette Valley. A strong applicant pool was established and the top applicants are proceeding through the process.

Our Canine Drug Detection Program has suffered this past year with personnel reductions, as our handler is now working a primary patrol position. This creates challenges for our team to maintain their training hours, work patrol and also find time for proactive efforts. One of the primary goals for 2012 will be to develop strategies to have Turbo more involved in proactive efforts. Regardless of the actual seizures though, Turbo is still invaluable as a deterrent and is still funded entirely by donations.

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The biggest addition to personnel this year was the development of a reserve police officer program. As 2011 came to a close, BCPD had selected three individuals to serve as reserve officers and will be sending them through the inaugural session of the Eastern Oregon Reserve Police Academy. This academy will be held in Baker City and is scheduled to have reserves attending from four different agencies within our region.

Policies & Procedures

Having policies and procedures in place, before they are needed, is paramount to success. Five years ago our agency adopted the Lexipol policy manual and completed the editing for our department. Each year, as part of the service Lexipol provides, we receive two separate updates outlining changes in case law, state law and federal law. These updates ensure our agency retains an extremely comprehensive policy manual. This past year we completed those updates and in addition made further changes and additions specific to our department.

As part of our contract, we also receive and administer Daily Training Bulletins (DTB) which provides exposure to BCPD's policies through scenario-based training and its real world application. This program focus is on *high-risk* events with special emphasis on *high-risk, low-frequency* situations. The DTBs are designed to take approximately 4-7 minutes to complete. These cover a variety of topics, as shown below from the 2011 list.

K9 DRUG DETENTION

Our Canine Drug Detection Program features handler Officer Rand Weaver, a six year member of our department, who teamed up with Turbo in 2010 to serve our community. Both attended training facilitated by the Oregon Police Canine Association (OPCA) in Baker City. Officer Weaver coordinated this training event which was attended by multiple teams from Central and Eastern Oregon. Officer Weaver and Turbo successfully received their OPCA Certification.

DRUG INTERDICTIONS

Disrupting the flow of narcotics, along with apprehending those responsible, remains a department priority. With the use of our drug detecting canine, our abilities to accomplish this are greatly enhanced. This past year we had several low level interdictions in our city. The most significant interdiction was when during a routine traffic stop, Turbo alerted on the vehicle, which resulted in a search warrant being executed on the vehicle. That led to the recovery of trace amounts of narcotics and drug paraphernalia. Stolen checks were also discovered which led to the opening of a new theft and forgery case. In turn, the follow up on the case led to the discovery of more stolen property from a past burglary. Turbo was also used to check lockers at Baker High School in an on-going effort to promote a drug free environment. School staff has requested the use of Turbo for more frequent onsite checks.

Special Events

Interacting with the community in many other ways

Going beyond the core function of a police department takes forward thinking, dedication and a sincere desire to raise the standard in your department and make your community a better place to live.

The Baker City Police Department's progressive nature fosters an atmosphere to encourage positive change.

Looking back on 2011, we were able to accomplish many achievements to aid in the development of our department and enhance the safety and livability in our community.



The attractive nature of our community, along with the ambitious character of our citizens, leads to our city being the host of several major events each year. The Baker City Police Department has a pivotal role during these events, not only for the obvious safety and security reasons, but also by setting the tone for the visitors. Our officers are proud of their ability to maintain safety, while enabling a relaxed atmosphere our visitors and citizens

Some of the events and functions our staff assisted with were:

- ✂ BCPD provided security for the **2011 OSAA 1A State Tournament**. Officers provide security for this week-long event every year including the championship game.
- ✂ BCPD Personnel were called upon to assist with the **2011 Miner's Jubilee**, which was a community success.
- ✂ BCPD Officers assisted Brooklyn Primary Staff and volunteers with a "fitness day", where students walked to the park and learned about staying active.
- ✂ BCPD Personnel provided security at the **2011 Shrine** parade and football game.
- ✂ CSO Shannon Regan delivered several safety presentations to Head Start Children which included Identification Packets for parent to complete.
- ✂ Several BCPD personnel participated in the **2011 National Night Out** function held at our city park. This event has grown over the years and the department was pleased to see an estimated 1,500 people in attendance.
- ✂ Chief Lohner attended the Opening Ceremony for Corrections Officer's Week at the Powder River Correctional Institution.
- ✂ BCPD participated in the downtown **Trick or Treat Halloween** event, greeting well over 1,000 children.
- ✂ BCPD provided extra staffing to help with potential safety issues during the **2011 Hell's Canyon Rally** (<http://www.hellscanyonrally.com>). There were no rally associated arrests.
- ✂ BCPD personnel assisted the Commission on Children and Families with **Red Ribbon Week**. Each year our officers hand out "goody bags" to children in the community who have pledged to stay drug free.
- ✂ BCPD provided extra staffing to help with traffic safety concerns during the **2011 Elkhorn Classic** (<http://www.elkhornclassic.com>) stage race. During this event, the BCPD also facilitated the Bike Safety Rodeo and provided free bike helmets to those in need. The helmets were provided to BCPD by ODOT.
- ✂ BCPD Car Seat Technician facilitated a car seat clinic at Baker High School during the Parent Resource Fair. New car seats were made available a to citizens along with inspections of older ones.
- ✂ BCPD Personnel were treated to an Appreciation Dessert Gathering at Settler's Park in recognition of National Law Enforcement Officer's Memorial Week.

Community Services

Other community service functions

Chief Lohner and Juvenile Department Officer, Staci Erickson, spoke to 6th graders regarding the consequences of making serious treats.

BCPD personnel sold dog licenses to community members at an annual rabies clinic.

The schedule and planning for the Eastern Oregon Regional Reserve Academy was finalized. Recruits will begin training in January 2012.

Chief Lohner and Sergeant McCormick met with MVMH Director Jennifer Yturriondobeitia and caseworker Elle Spangle to discuss available services as a collaborative effort to enhance services and safety in our community.

Chief Lohner delivered the commencement address at the Police Academy in Salem, Oregon.

BCPD personnel assisted with the starting of the local Easter Egg Hunt in the Geiser-Pollman park.

BCPD began a systematic effort to check the compliance status of the registered sex offenders living in our community.

Chief Lohner participated in a *Robbery Response Training Seminar* for Sterling Bank employees.

BCPD staff observed and critiqued a lockdown drill at Eagle Cap School located in N. Baker School.

Detective Jay Lohner partnered with the District Attorney in presenting information to a local community organization about fraud.

Chief Lohner and SRO Regan attended a meeting with the Oregon Youth Authority to relay our concerns of having offenders placed in our community who are associated with gang-type behavior.

Evidence Technician / Receptionist Megan Farrow participated in two car seat clinics, teaching local parents how to properly install car seats.

BCPD continues to provide car seats to low income community members, purchased with funds from an ODOT grant. 78 car seats were installed during this grant cycle.

BCPD continued to host onsite the Baker County Justice Court staff, who were forced to leave the courthouse after extensive water damage to the facility.

BCPD participated in a meeting with New Hope, who has partnered with BCPD to continue the Trap-Neuter-Return program in Baker City. Two successful TNR's were completed, attending to approximately 40 animals.

BCPD partnered with the Salvation Army and hosted an Angel Tree and a food barrel. A total of 47 Angel Tree tags were fulfilled, making for a brighter Christmas Holiday for many Baker County children in need.



Property Maintenance

Successful property clean-ups

Property maintenance is the overall upkeep of a facility or home and its surrounding property. Property maintenance is enforced in residential zones.

In order to maintain good property maintenance, city-wide property maintenance ordinances were created.

Property clean up is a residents responsibility; however, it sometimes becomes a neighborhood and a city responsibility as well.

Property maintenance efforts have proven that a community can come together and help achieve healthier homes, blocks and neighborhoods. Property maintenance includes graffiti, household garbage stored outside, unsafe/unsanitary conditions and unattractive nuisances.

18 property maintenance cases were opened in 2011. Of these cases, 1 remains out of compliance and will be cited, 10 cases complied, and 7 cases were issued non-compliance citations.

Training



Training is one of the most important functions a police department

must maintain and work at improving. Along with minimum training requirements from our Public Safety Academy, which

are required for officers to maintain their certification, changes to case law governing protocols require constant training. Areas encompassing perishable skills developed with regard to use of force, defensive tactics and other high risk acts also require consistent high level training. OSHA trainings and other policy mandated trainings are also included in our annual training schedule. If these trainings are not maintained, the safety of our officers, community members and visitors is jeopardized. Failure to properly train also creates an opening for criminal and civil liability.

In addition to the required trainings, we attempt to send officers to other trainings also. These trainings are advantageous to the development of the officer, while providing the department and community with a better overall officer. Officers who have particular interests, such as drug interdiction or investigations, can also receive specialized training that will help them to excel even farther.

Unfortunately our location in Oregon adds an economic factor into training that most police departments in our State do not face. Travel time, and other associated costs, is far greater for Eastern Oregon Law Enforcement agencies than what it is for those in the Willamette Valley. Most training seminars in Oregon are either taught at the Academy in Salem, or hosted by the larger departments on the I-5 corridor. This necessitates we maintain in-house instructors, to help reduce that economic impact, and maintain budget allocations for trainings.

Special trainings :

- Det. Bass attended Follow the Money – financial investigations including money laundering and asset forfeitures.
- Det. Lohner, Det. Bass, and Chief Lohner attended a “Driving Distracted” training.
- BCPD supervisory staff took six *National Incident Management System* classes online as a new requirement from the Federal Government.
- BCPD staff participated in multiple scenario-based trainings and firearms range trainings throughout the year.
- Chief Lohner, Sgt. McCormick, and Sgt. Regan attended a BOLI training.
- Sgt. Regan’s squad participated in Hazard Communication training.
- Detective Bass attended the Oregon Narcotics Enforcement Officer seminar in Central Oregon. This was funded by grant monies.
- Sgt. Regan and Officer Weaver completed a *Glock Armorers* course which allows them to inspect and make repairs to service weapons.
- Det. Bass and Chief Lohner completed training through the Bureau of Justice Assistance, relating to Drug Task Force management.
- BCPD staff participated in multiple Defensive Tactics Trainings throughout the year.
- CSO/SRO Regan attended a Suicide Prevention training sponsored by Baker High School.
- BCPD contracted with Police One, which offers numerous videos of various topics related to police services. One or more of these videos is shown during daily patrol briefings.

Investigations

The Baker City Police Department is very fortunate to have two experienced, motivated and exceptionally gifted investigators. Both of our detectives are involved in nearly all major crimes in our community, and are members of the Baker County Major Crimes Team. However, our detectives do have specialties. Detective Jay Lohner focuses on person crimes such as sex abuse, child abuse and assaults, while Detective Sharon Bass has a primary mission associated with illegal narcotics. Detective Bass is also a member of the Baker County Narcotics Enforcement Team (BCNET).


Some of the cases our investigators initiated or assisted with from 2011 include:

- ✦ 31 death investigations in the city.
- ✦ 1 homicide investigation which occurred in Sumpter and was investigated by BCPD as part of the Baker County Major Crime Team.
- ✦ 36 cases and/or reports initially taken by patrol officers that were later assigned to an investigator.
- ✦ Multiple sex crime investigations.
- ✦ Multiple fraud investigations.
- ✦ Assisted with DHS/Child Protective Services relating to child endangerment cases.
- ✦ Multiple drug investigations.
- ✦ Year-end-totals reflect 96 cases initiated by investigators.

Early in 2011, the Baker City Police Department became the lead agency in the Albert and Rita Chretien missing person case after they were last seen in Baker City and then failed to return home from a trip to Las Vegas. This case generated international attention and involved resources from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Baker City Police Department, Oregon State Police, Baker County Sheriff's Office, and Law Enforcement resources from four other states. Rita was found alive in the mountains of Nevada. To date, Albert has not been located.



Crime Rates & Police Statistics



Crime rates for the most part are cyclical and will vary based on numerous factors. While police play a pivotal role in crime rates, we are only part of the equation, as we are only one part of the criminal justice system. A system which consists of the District

Attorney who prosecutes cases, Judges who preside over the Hearings and Trials, Juries and Judges who determine guilt, Jails and Prisons which house the offenders, Treatment Providers who assist the offenders and Parole and Probation Officers who supervise the offenders when they are released. Each piece of the system is critical and any breakdown can affect crime rates. Of course there are many other factors from economic to demographic, which also play a large role in crime rates. An additional factor in small communities with low crime rates, such as Baker City, is “spree crimes”. One individual or group, which goes on a spree and for example breaks into cars or houses or businesses, can greatly affect the statistics.

In Baker City the overall crime rate stayed virtually unchanged in 2011, when comparing the criminal reports taken in 2011 to 2010 numbers. Our community is still very fortunate to not have organized gangs residing in our city. However, we saw our first gang activity this past year with about a dozen students displaying gang attire and claiming gang affiliation. Our school resource officer has worked hard at deterring this activity and our department is committed to doing everything we can to keep it from gaining a foothold.

Traffic safety efforts continued to be a priority, focusing on education, compliance and enforcement. In 2011 our traffic citations written increased 22% and our crashes were reduced by 23%, indicating our efforts were a success.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

Animal Control

- ✧ **15 Dog at Large citations** were issued.
- ✧ **4 No Dog License citations** were issued.
- ✧ **520 dogs** were licensed city wide.
- ✧ **72 dogs were impounded:** 81% were claimed by an owner; 14% were euthanized as they were not adoptable or not claimed by an owner, and 5% were adopted.
- ✧ **5 livestock permits, 3 kennel permits, and 1 exotic animal permit** were issued.

Weed Abatement

- ✧ **107 complaints of weed abatement** were addressed during 2011, with 87 of the complaints coming into compliance upon receipt of written notification from BCPD. The remaining 20 non-compliant complaints were hired out to local contractors by Baker City at the expense of the property owner.


