A MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF



As Chief of Police it is my great pleasure to introduce you to the 2012 year-end report for the Baker City Police

Department. The twelve men and five women who make up our paid staff are dedicated

professionals with a sincere adoration for the community they serve. We hope that you find this report informative and that it will give you an insight into our community as well as to the men and women tasked with enhancing overall safety.

Our truly rural Eastern Oregon community has a unique tendency to attract caring people with traditional values. Our officers are no different and have chosen to live and work here for a variety of reasons. From our endless opportunities to enjoy outdoor activities, to our great public education system, to our low-stress environment, there are many reasons we are proud to call this place home.

The Baker City Police Department (BCPD) is the only law enforcement agency within the 3088 square miles of Baker County to have 24 hour per

day staffing, every day of the year. Our primary commitment to our community is to have patrol staff available to respond to the needs of our citizens at any time of the day or night.

The past year we saw the realization of two long standing goals with the implementation of our Reserve Program, which included the inaugural session of the Eastern Oregon Regional Reserve Police Academy, and the formation of the Northeast Oregon SWAT Team. BCPD currently has four reserve officers, with two in the current academy, and three department members on the regional SWAT Team.

This coming year one of our top goals is to see significant progress with our community livability, by aggressively addressing city code violations. We will work with citizens and property owners through education and encouragement, but also use the court system to enforce accountability as the need arises.

We have been grateful of our supportive community throughout 2012 and are hopeful that 2013 will be another great year for our department and the community we serve.



MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Baker City Police Department is to work in partnership with our community members, to actively promote the safety and welfare of our citizens, along with enriching their quality of life through the delivery of professional police services.



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PERSONNEL –THE MEN AND WOMEN WHO SERVE

CHAPLAINCY PROGRAM

Our Chaplaincy Program currently stands at five strong. We have four Chaplains primarily serving the Baker City area and one other Chaplain who lives in the Baker County panhandle. All of our Chaplains are classified as Public Safety Chaplains; serving the needs of police, fire, EMS and dispatch. This past year they were invaluable, assisting our department with death notifications to families and providing counseling to officers.

CITIZEN ON PATROL PROGRAM

This past year our Citizen on Patrol (COP) Program maintained five active volunteers. They assisted with placement and monitoring of the radar trailer and also assisted during community events such as the children's bike rodeo held during the Baker City Cycling Classic.

We also welcomed new front-desk volunteer, Edith Richerson. Edith hails from Mukilteo, Washington. She moved to Baker City to be closer to family. Formally a bus driver for public transportation in Everett, Washington, Edith is a wonderful addition to BCPD. She has graciously assisted with a variety of secretarial duties when needed.

Staffing changes in 2012 for the Baker City Police Department

brought transitions in assignments for veteran officers and the introduction of two new officers.

Officer Shannon Regan who had served as the department's Community Service and Code Enforcement Officer for the past eighteen months was given a full-time assignment in the patrol division. Officer Craig Davidson who had served as a Patrol Officer for over three years was given the assignment as our department's Community Service and School Resource Officer.

Officer Davidson began his career as a police officer with our department on April 28, 2009. At the time, he was serving as the supervisor of the City of Nampa, Idaho code enforcement division. Officer Davidson brings experience, enthusiasm and a creative outlook on how to address the numerous code enforcement issues throughout our community. He is also looking forward to working with students and faculty in our high school, constantly striving to enhance the safety of our students.

PERSONNEL -THE MEN AND WOMEN WHO SERVE

K9 PROGRAM

In 2012 Turbo, with the assistance of his handler Officer Weaver, participated in or conducted:

- ⇒ over 134 hours of training
- ⇒ 3 demonstrations where children or the general public were present.
- ⇒ 34 deployments in which Turbo alerted 39 times resulting in 28 findings of illegal substances leading to 12 arrests and/or citations being issued.
- ⇒ Turbo found marijuana, methamphetamine, pills, and drug paraphernalia.

Turbo and Officer Weaver were deployed at the request of the following agencies:

- ⇒ Baker City Police Department –22 occurrences
- ⇒ Baker County Sheriff's Office –4 occurrences
- ⇒ Oregon State Police –4 occurrences
- ⇒ Parole and Probation –1 occurrence
- ⇒ Baker 5J School District –2 occurrences
- ⇒ Out of County Agency –1 occurrence
- ⇒ Others –2 occurrences

Additional changes in duties to existing staff included changes to how the Field Training Program is managed and oversight of the Daily Training Bulletins. Officer Wayne Bailey has taken on the responsibility of supervising the Field Training Program. He will be scheduling meetings with FTO's, reviewing all of the observation reports and coordinating with the sergeants to ensure this program produces quality officers. Officer Wayne Chastain will be managing the Police Department's Daily Training Bulletin program. He is tasked with reviewing all of the bulletins to ensure they are in line with our revised policy manual and then publishing them for staff review.



Officer Rand Weaver continues to be the handler assigned to our department's drug detection canine Turbo. Turbo is in his 6th year of serving our community as a drug sniffing canine. Turbo is used in many roles throughout the year from a drug finder at traffic stops, to a searcher in buildings, to an educator in our schools and at community functions; however, his greatest role is as a deterrent. It is easy to measure the amount of drugs seized and persons arrested, but you can never measure the value of having a deterrent such as a drug dog that helps to prevent drug trafficking and use in our community.

In 2012, Officer Weaver deployed Turbo in multiple Baker County Schools, as well as traveling over 70 miles to Grant County in order to assist their communities with drug deterrent efforts in several of their schools.



When utilized in a school environment, Turbo and Officer Weaver are a positive presence that deters students from bringing illegal substances into our schools, enhancing a safe and drug-free environment for our youth. Turbo also excels at making new friends with the students and staff.

EASTERN OREGON REGIONAL RESERVE ACADEMY

The 22nd weekend of the Eastern Oregon Regional Reserve Police Academy culminated the program with a well-attended graduation held on June 2, 2012. The graduation took place in the council chambers at city hall with every seat filled. Sergeant Kirk McCormick, the academy coordinator, was recognized for his outstanding direction of this inaugural session. Former Police Chief and Dispatch Director, Jerry Boyd delivered the commencement address.

On September 12, 2012 Jerry Boyd was sworn in by BCPD as a Reserve Commander, assuming oversight of our agency's reserve program. His extensive police background will not only catapult our reserve program, but also be a tremendous benefit to our entire agency. He provided oversight through the selection process for our newest recruits and will be responsible for addressing training needs and deployment considerations for each of our reserve officers.

In addition, Commander Boyd also accepted the position of Reserve Academy Coordinator and is responsible for facilitating the 2013 academy. In addition to our two recruits, three recruits from the Baker County Sheriff's Office, three recruits from the Nyssa Police Department, one recruit from the La Grande Police Department and two recruits from the Union County Sheriff's Office will be attending this session. Additional staff from various agencies will attend selected classes as determined by

What does it take to be a Reserve Police Officer with the Baker City Police Dept. ?

- ➔ Applicants must be at least 18 years of age at the time of appointment. Reserves under the age of 21 can perform many important and interesting duties; however, they cannot carry a firearm until their 21st birthday.
- ➔ Applicants must pass State of Oregon required written and physical fitness tests.
- ➔ Applicants must pass a rigorous background investigation.
- ➔ Applicants must complete the 225-hour Eastern Oregon Regional Reserve Academy (held on 22-consecutive Saturdays generally beginning in January of each year.
- ➔ Applicants must be willing to donate a minimum of 20 hours of service each month which includes a monthly reserve training meeting.

WHAT IT TAKES

To receive quality, updated training is an extremely important facet of providing a competent law enforcement agency to the community they serve. Laws, and especially the interpretations of these laws, routinely change. Police tactics and best practices also routinely change as technology, weaponry and other various threats evolve in our society. In addition, police are required to complete



certain amounts and types of training just to receive and maintain their certifications. These facts combine to make training one of the most critical needs we have. (Officers are shown here completing confrontational simulation training. A variety of officer safety, OSHA, and policy trainings are required each year which is in addition to the special trainings listed below.)

SPECIAL TRAININGS:

- Officer Craig Davidson attended Field Training Evaluation Program training. This training is necessary for Officer Davidson to perform the role of Field Training Officer. Officer Davidson also completed training required in the use and instruction of the TASER X26 and X2 Electronic Control Devices.
- Administrative Assistant Phoebe Wachtel attended training to become a Certified Carseat Technician.
- Sergeant Mike Regan attended “*Traumas of Law Enforcement*” training. He also completed all four sessions of the *Ford Institute Leadership Program* and will continue to participate in mini-sessions scheduled in 2013.
- Sergeant Mike Regan, Sergeant Kirk McCormick, Officer Wayne Bailey, and Officer Wayne Chastain attended “*Law Enforcement Supervisor Force Liability Prevention*” training.
- K9 Handler Rand Weaver attended the Pacific Northwest Police Detention Dog Association 2012 Conference and the Oregon Police Canine Working Dog Seminar.
- Sergeant Josh Bryant completed a 10-week online supervisor's course titled, “*The Leader's Journey: Leading from the Front-Lines.*”
- Officer Shannon Regan attended the Northwest Gang Investigators Association and the 2012 Child Abuse and Family Violence Summit.
- Officer Gerrit Southard attended Criminal Interdiction Training and Seminar – “*Operation Pipeline/Convoy*” Training. He also attended “*Winning the Battle*” Conference with his wife, Darcy. “*Winning the Battle*” is a seminar that helps couples enhance their relationship when one spouse works in law enforcement.
- Officer Wayne Chastain attended ICS 300/400 class.
- Sergeant Kirk McCormick attended “*ECW –TASER® Legal Issues and Litigation*” training.
- Evidence Technician Shannin Davidson attended Property Room Training which is required for her position.
- Detective Sharon Bass attended the Oregon Narcotics Enforcement Association Conference.
- Officer Zach Downing attended “*Reid Technique of Interviewing and Interrogations*” training.
- BCPD staff attended “*First Responders Training for Returning Veterans*” sponsored by the Oregon National Guard.
- Chief Wyn Lohner and Sergeant Kirk McCormick attended Civil Commitment Training, an overview of the civil commitment process in Oregon for allegedly mentally ill persons.
- Several members of BCPD participated in Gang Awareness training, taught by Ontario PD Gang Officer Elizondo.

EASTERN OREGON REGIONAL SWAT



One detriment of providing services in a truly rural community is the lack of available resources. That is why consolidation and teamwork through interagency agreements is a standard in Eastern Oregon. The need for tactical support to augment police services is no different and has been a priority goal of our department's for many years. In 2012 an agreement was

reached with the La Grande Police Department to create the Northeast Oregon Regional SWAT Team. Members of the Baker County Sheriff's Office and the Union County Sheriff's Office have also joined to comprise this team, which trains together monthly to provide services throughout Baker and Union Counties.

This team presents a timely alternative to high risk situations in our community and region, without having to solely depend on the services provided by the Oregon State Police (OSP) SWAT Team. The OSP Team is a highly trained group that deploys throughout Oregon. Most of their members live and work in the Willamette Valley, which unfortunately means that a response to



a situation in Eastern Oregon can take anywhere from four to eight hours, providing they are available and not already deployed on a mission elsewhere.



Our Northeast Oregon Regional SWAT Team has high expectations and has set strict standards, ensuring that their service will reach the highest level of safety and competency. They are a hard working dedicated group, committed to going well beyond their day to day police roles by making themselves available to respond and resolve some of the most dangerous situations.

ADOPTED BUDGET



The City of Baker City participated in a survey developed by ICMA, (International City/ County Management Association) in which several operational areas of the City were compared with other jurisdictions.

In conducting this survey, ICMA reported that BCPD fields 15.9 full time police equivalents at a cost of just over \$1.6 million dollars and that the citizens of Baker City pay \$163.65 per person a year to operate, equip, and maintain the Baker City Police Department. The average cost per person for the other jurisdictions participating in the survey was \$209.96 per person for police expenditures.

The operational budget for Baker City Police Department remains virtually unchanged from fiscal year 2011 -2012. We are proud to serve our community in a fiscally responsible manner while maintaining core police services and other programs that continue to enhance the community we live and work in.

GRANTS REVIEW

For police services, the number of grants are declining while the competition for grants is rising. The City Of Baker City is fortunate to have a low crime rate and a stable budget, but those two characteristics are a detriment to receiving grants. We were once again denied at the federal level to receive dollars to fund an additional police officer position. 2012 was the third time we had applied for a position under the COPS Hiring and Recovery Program. We were fortunate to receive these grants:

- ⇒ **\$1,500** from Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) Traffic Safety project – this grant is utilized to provide child safety seats to the children of low-income families and includes education on the proper use and installation of carseats to reduce injuries and deaths.
- ⇒ **\$1,143** in youth and children-sized bicycle helmets purchase by Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) which were given out during the annual Bicycle Rodeo and throughout the summer to children without means to purchase their own helmet.
- ⇒ **\$3,402** from National Institute of Justice (NIJ)—this grant will be utilized to purchase 4 NIJ-compliant armored vests for law enforcement personnel. This grant requires an equal match from the City to meet the total cost of the four vests.

SPECIAL EVENTS



Going beyond the core function of a police department takes forward thinking, dedication and a sincere desire to raise the standard in your department and make your community a better place to live.

The Baker City Police Department's progressive nature fosters an atmosphere to encourage positive changes.

Looking back on 2012, we were able to accomplish many achievements to aid in the development of our department and enhance the safety and livability in our community.

Committed community partners in small, rural communities always seem to go the extra mile to help one another out and make their community the best it can be. Members of the Baker City Police Department certainly fit into this mold, as we try to go beyond our core responsibilities and serve our community at multiple levels. We believe in giving back and going the extra mile, because we truly are privileged to serve in the greatest community in Oregon!

Some of the events and functions our staff assisted with were:

- * BCPD provided security for the **2012 OSAA 1A State Tournament**. Officers provide security for this week-long event every year including the championship game.
- * BCPD Administrative Assistant and Carseat Technician, Phoebe Wachtel, participated in two carseat clinics, one held during the Parent Resource Fair at BHS and another held at Head Start. She also presented carseat/occupant safety at a meeting for the local chapter of MOPS (Mothers of Preschoolers).
- * BCPD provided extra staffing to assist with safety concerns during the 2012 **Hell's Canyon Rally** (<http://www.hellscanyonrally.com/>). Reserve Officers Tyler Thamert and Tyler Stuck assisted sworn Officers, primarily working foot patrol during this event. The rally brought an estimated 3000 –4000 visitors to Baker City during the three-day event.
- * BCPD provided traffic control for the **Baker City Cycling Classic** (<http://www.bakercitycycling.org/BCCC/Home.html>). In addition, bicycle helmets were made available during the Kids' Bike Rodeo. Citizens On Patrol, Mary Ward and Ron Hoag and Reserve Officer Tyler Thamert assisted with this event.
- * Several BCPD officers assisted with security and traffic control during the 2012 Miner's Jubilee Celebration.
- * BCPD personnel assisted with traffic control at the 2012 Shrine Parade and with security at the 2012 Shrine football game.
- * BCPD participated in the 2012 National Night Our Celebration held at Geiser Pollman Park. Approximately 700 citizens were in attendance, despite the extreme heat.
- * Evidence Technician, Shannin Davidson and Reserve Officer Tyler Thamert staffed two National Drug Take Back events, April 28th and September 29. Citizens brought in expired, unused and unwanted prescription drugs for proper disposal.
- * Reserve Commander Jerry Boyd and Reserve Officer Tyler Thamert were on hand for the downtown trick-or-treat event, conducting foot patrols and interacting with the children present.

Other community service functions

- Chief Lohner participated as a member of a state-wide review committee of the 16-week DPSST Police Academy curriculum.
- BCPD personnel sold dog licenses to community members at the annual rabies clinic.
- The schedule and planning for the 2nd Annual Eastern Oregon Regional Reserve Academy was finalized. Recruits begin classes January 5, 2013.
- Chief Lohner participated in the Armed Services Day ceremony in Salem, where several Eastern Oregon employers were recognized by the Oregon Attorney General, on behalf of the Governor.
- BCPD personnel assisted with the starting of the local Easter Egg Hunt in the Geiser-Pollman park.
- Chief Lohner provided security during Senator Merkley's visit to our community and Sergeant McCormick provided security during Senator's Wyden's visit.
- BCPD continues to partner with New Hope of Eastern Oregon in administering the Trap-Neuter-Return program in Baker City. Eleven successful TNR's were completed, attending to approximately 79 animals.
- Chief Lohner conducted an after action briefing with Sterling Bank employees, following a false alarm call at the bank.
- BCPD continues to provide carseats to low-income families, purchased with funds from an ODOT grant. During this grant cycle: 54 parents were educated on the proper fit of a carseat and a total of 40 carseats were purchased by citizens. 8 carseats inspected did not meet standards due to missing labels, expiration of the seat, and/or missing owner's manual.
- Chief Lohner conducted a robbery response and protocol safety presentation at the Oregon Trail Electric Cooperative.
- Chief Lohner and Sergeant McCormick met with St. Alphonsus Hospital administrators regarding procedures for processing mental holds. Chief Lohner also attended meetings to continue discussions around establishing a Mental Health Crisis Observation Room.
- Officer Davidson provided a tour of the police station and a safety presentation to a group of Baker City preschoolers.
- Chief Lohner and Administrative Asst. Wachtel attended a meeting to discuss the possibility of forming a Safe Kids Tri-County Coalition to include Baker, Wallowa, and Union counties.
- BCPD partnered with the Salvation Army and hosted an Angel Tree and a food barrel. The Angel Tree was met with an overwhelming response from the community, making for a brighter Christmas for many Baker City children in need.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

CODE ENFORCEMENT

Animal Control

- ✧ **19 Dog at Large citations** were issued.
- ✧ **3 Allowing a Dog to be a Nuisance citations** were issued.
- ✧ **6 No Dog License citations** were issued.
- ✧ **8 Other Animal Violations** were issued.
- ✧ **592 dogs** were licensed city wide, a 14% increase from last year.
- ✧ **125 dogs were impounded**, a 74% increase in dogs impounded from last year. Of the dogs impounded in 2012, 73% were claimed by an owner; 4% were euthanized as they were not adoptable or not claimed by an owner, and 23% were adopted out.
- ✧ **3 livestock permits, 4 kennel permits, and 1 exotic animal permit** were issued.

Weed Abatement

- ✧ **140 complaints of weed abatement** were addressed during 2012, with 123 of the complaints coming into compliance upon receipt of written notification from BCPD. The remaining 17 non-compliant complaints were hired out to local contractors by Baker City at the expense of the property owner.



The mission of code enforcement is to promote community awareness and facilitate voluntary compliance with Baker City Municipal Codes to enhance the quality of life and foster civic pride.

Crime prevention specialists know that property neglect

sends a negative message which perpetuates further decay, lowers property values, and attracts the criminal element. Intervention through partnerships within the community, local law enforcement and fire safety officers, are a golden opportunity to build long-term relationships while educating residents, ensuring property code compliance, and helping individuals in need of assistance. We feel this is especially true today and this is reflected in our vision for code enforcement which is to optimize all available resources in order to foster positive relationships with Baker City's community residents and local businesses.

INVESTIGATIONS

The community of Baker City is fortunate to harbor a very safe environment, free from many of the daily acts of violence that occur in larger communities and even in many smaller communities throughout our state and nation. However, that does not mean that we are completely void of violent acts, drug abuse or complicated fraud crimes.

Fortunately, our department has two experienced investigators to take the lead, or assist, with the higher level and more problematical crimes that do occur in our community. They also place an emphasis on proactive efforts to reduce drug related crimes, which tears at the heart of most communities.

Our two investigators are active members of the Baker County Major Crime Team, which is called upon to investigate most major felonies and other

cases that require significant manpower throughout Baker County. Along with our detectives, this team is comprised of members of the Oregon State Police and the Baker County Sheriff's Office. Many of these same members also work together to form the Baker County Narcotics Enforcement Team, which regularly works together to target drug related crimes in our county and at times throughout our region.

Quality investigations are an expectation of our detectives and their success is clearly evident by the fact that rarely does a major crime's case ever go to trial in our community. Guilty plea agreements with the District Attorney's Office has become the standard for most of these cases, many resulting in extended prison sentences under ballot Measure 11 guidelines.

CRIME RATES AND POLICE STATISTICS

Crime rates for the most part are cyclical and will vary based on numerous factors which relate to demographic and economic factors, but also, the criminal justice systems as a whole. Any breakdown in this system can have a startling impact on the type of crimes a particular community might encounter. An additional factor in small communities with low crime rates, such as Baker City, is "spree crimes". One individual or group, participating in a criminal spree such as multiple burglaries committed in private homes or businesses, can greatly affect the statistics. Notable statistics for 2012 reflect the following increases and/or decreases when compared with 2011:



- * **10% increase** in reports written, of which **69%** were written for criminal offenses and **31%** were written for non-criminal incidents.

- * **4% increase** in overall arrests. Within this statistic, it was noted that traffic related arrests had increase by **40%** which includes a

25% increase in DUII arrests.

- * **16% decrease** in overall citations were written in 2012. Citations issued for moving violations **decreased by 18%** and citations issued for parking **decreased by 32%**. Citations issued for non-traffic offenses remained virtually unchanged for this time period.


- * **9% decrease** in traffic warnings were issued.

- * **44% decrease** in motor vehicle accidents, not including hit and run. Hit and run incidents remained virtually unchanged for this time period.

OVERVIEW


