

served the citizens and visitors of Baker City this past year are dedicated professionals with a sincere adoration for the community they serve. We hope that you find this report informative and that it will give you an insight into the service we provide to our community.

The Baker City Police Department (BCPD) is the only law enforcement agency within

the 3088 square miles of Baker County to have 24 hour per day staffing, every day of the year. Our primary commitment to our community is to have patrol staff available to respond to the needs of our citizens at any time of the day or night.

The past year we continued to build our newly formed Reserve Program and hosted the second session of the Eastern Oregon Regional Reserve

The mission of the Baker City Police Department is to work in partnership with our community members, to actively promote the safety and welfare of our citizens, along with enriching their quality of life through the delivery of professional police services.

This coming year one of our top goals will remain code enforcement. In an attempt to increase consistency and accountability, we will be reorganizing our department and bringing back a civilian Code Enforcement Officer (CEO), who will exclusively focus on these community livability issues. Our new CEO will also be responsible for

Animal Control, working alongside our police officers and city council to implement our Dangerous/Vicious Dog ordinance and to enforce other animal related violations.

We have been grateful of our supportive community throughout 2013 and are hopeful that 2014 will be another great year for our department and the community we serve.

PERSONNEL –THE MEN AND WOMEN WHO SERVE

Staffing within the Baker City Police Department continues to evolve in order to meet the challenges of providing our community with core police services. 2013 proved to make this particularly true with transitions in assignments for veteran officers and the introduction of one new officer.

Officer Craig Davidson began this past year serving in the dual role of Code Enforcement Officer and School Resource Officer, spending part of his daily shift onsite at the Baker High School. This position was once again adapted when Officer Davidson was promoted to Detective within the Investigation Unit of the Department. Within this role, Detective Davidson continues his assignment as the School Resource Officer at BHS in addition to his duties as a Detective, specifically person crime investigation.

As this transition created a vacancy in Code Enforcement, the Department was in need of a dedicated officer to fulfill this important function and a selection process was started. Ultimately, Officer Wayne Chastain was selected to serve as the Code Enforcement Officer. In addition to addressing the various facets of Code Enforcement, Officer Chastain is responsible for covering patrol shifts as needed. **Officer Chastain also acts as the Department’s Drug Recognition Expert Educator.**



The introduction of the Department’s newest member came in November with the swearing in of Officer Coleton Smith. Officer Coleton Smith, a Baker High School graduate and former U.S. Navy veteran, had previously served this community as a BCPD Reserve Officer. As a Reserve Officer, Smith had experience working alongside BCPD Officers in variety of settings and assisting with various supportive duties, such as providing extra foot patrol during large community events. He is excited to realize his long-standing goal of becoming a fully sworn officer for the Baker City Police Department. Officer Smith will begin Basic Police Officer Academy in late January 2014.

Officer Rand Weaver continues to be the handler assigned to our department’s drug detection canine Turbo. Turbo is in his 7th year of serving our community as a drug sniffing canine. Most recently, Turbo and Officer Weaver successfully completed training and testing that enables the team to maintain their Narcotic Detection Canine Team Certification Record as granted through the Pacific Northwest Police Detection Dog Association.

VOLUNTEERS



In April 2013, Lori McNeil was selected for the position of Volunteer Coordinator for the Baker City Police Department’s Citizen on Patrol (COP) Program.

This program has existed in the community for roughly 3 years, operating on a small scale with limited activities. McNeil was brought on board to help develop the program further and expand services already being offered in order to better serve the community.

The Citizen on Patrol (COP) Program is a volunteer program that works hand-in hand with the Baker City Police Department for overall safety, health and vitality of the Baker City Community.

VOLUNTEERS

CHAPLAINCY PROGRAM

Our Chaplaincy Program currently stands at five strong. We have four Chaplains primarily serving the Baker City area and one other Chaplain who lives in the Baker County panhandle. All of our Chaplains are classified as Public Safety Chaplains; serving the needs of police, fire, EMS and dispatch. This past year they were invaluable, assisting our department with death notifications to families and providing counseling to officers including an especially difficult case involving the tragic death of a five-year old as the direct result of a pit bull attack.

COP applicants must complete a preliminary interview and a secondary interview along with a criminal background check to be considered. Once accepted, each new COP must complete the Citizen on Patrol Training Program as well as topic-specific trainings throughout the year.

This past year the program received 20 applicants and currently has 10 active COP

Team members serving approximately 100 hours per month on average as a team.

In addition to the COP curriculum program training, the team completed CPR, First Aid and Bloodborne Pathogen training as well as introduction to criminal justice training, foot patrol observation trainings and hazardous material identification training. In the future, additional training will include procedural information regarding community emergency evacuations should extra assistance ever be needed.

The COP Team assisted the City with community surveys during the cryptosporidium outbreak, in addition to participating during Community Night Out, providing foot patrol during Miner's Jubilee, ongoing ordinance compliance checks and speed monitoring through the placement of the radar trailer.

The COP Program was successful in receiving their first grant in the amount of \$1,000 from Wal-Mart. These funds will be used to assist with the purchasing of new uniforms and other program needs which are essential in carrying out the job duties of the COP Program.

The vision for the program is to have 1 main COP Zone Leader for each of the 6 zones within the community emergency plan. Each zone leader will have 5-6 COPs that will make up their Zone Team. These individual teams will have regular meetings and address the concerns within that zone. We are working on recruiting new volunteers within each zone so that this plan can be implemented as soon as possible. There is also a plan to initiate checks on the homebound elderly residents of our community as well as checking on vacant homes and/or properties.

Chambers at City Hall. These dedicated individuals come from all over Eastern Oregon and represent the following agencies: Baker City Police Department, Baker County Sheriff's Office, La Grande Police Department, Union

County Sheriff's Office, Nyssa Police Department and the Baker City Fire Department. Reserve Commander and Academy Coordinator, Jerry Boyd, was recognized for his outstanding direction of this first annual session of the

BAKER CITY POLICE DEPARTMENT RESERVE PROGRAM

The Baker City Police Department averaged four Reserve Officers throughout the year, although for part of the year, two of the Reserves were completing the Reserve Academy. While four full-time Reserve Officers would have committed to 960 hours of service, assuming 20 hours a month per Reserve Officer, even at partial staffing these Reserves donated 1297.5 hours of volunteer service. At an entry level salary for a full-time officer, with no benefits included, this would equate to nearly \$30,500.00 of donated time in support of the department and the community.

The majority of the hours were spent assisting full-time officers with patrol duties. In addition to patrol, Reserve Officers provided the following types of assistance:

- Special Assignments and Scene Security (at locations for which search warrants were being sought).
- Special Events (to include, Shrine Football Game, Miner's Jubilee, Hells Canyon Motorcycle Rally, Downtown Halloween Trick-or-Treat, Christmas Parade and Nation Drug Take Back Events).

Reserves also assisted at the front desk of the Police Department and with the bicycle helmet program. Three additional Reserve cadets are scheduled to begin the academy in January. The Reserve Police Officer program looks forward to another great year serving the community in 2014.

NORTHEAST OREGON REGIONAL SWAT TEAM

The NEO Regional SWAT Team currently has 30 members and is comprised of personnel from four law enforcement agencies, two fire departments and one dispatch center. The participating agencies are the Baker City Police Department, Baker City Fire Department, Baker County Sheriff's Office, Baker County Consolidated Dispatch, La Grande Police Department, La Grande Fire Department and the Union County Sheriff's Office.

Within this team structure, there are three elements that collectively make up the SWAT: Tactical, TEMS (Tactical Emergency Medical Services) and CNT (Crisis Negotiations Team). The CNT was fully implemented in September. This table illustrates the partnering agencies' personnel contributions and their member's assignments within the team.

Training is further broken up into the following categories: tactical, rifle team and CNT. Tactical training is required for all members with the exception of CNT and comprises of a minimum of 4 hours per month. Rifle team training is an additional 4 hours per month. CNT members train at least once per month for a minimum of 4 hours. In 2013, the Tactical Team completed 52 hours of training, Rifle Team completed 41 hours of training and CNT completed 14 hours of training. In addition, 11 members of the team attended Basic SWAT School, comprising of 40 hours of training, and 2 members attended Basic Sniper School, also comprising of 40 hours of training. Both trainings were held centrally located in La Grande, Oregon.

The NEO Regional SWAT Team was activated in two separate incidents during the year. On March 3rd, the Team was activated to aid in the resolution of a barricaded subject in La Grande. This suspect was thought to be armed. On March 14th, the Baker County Narcotics Enforcement Team requested the assistance of the Team to serve a high-risk search warrant at a residence in Baker City.



WHAT IT TAKES

Receiving quality, updated training is an extremely important facet of providing a competent law enforcement agency to the community they serve. Laws, and especially the interpretations of these laws, routinely change. Police tactics and best practices also routinely change as technology, weaponry and other various threats evolve in our society. In addition, police are required to complete certain amounts and types of training just to receive and maintain their certifications. These facts combine to make training one of the most critical needs we have. *A variety of officer safety, OSHA, and policy trainings are required each year which is in addition to the special trainings listed below.*)

- ❖ Officer Shannon Regan, Officer Gerrit Southard, Sergeant Mike Regan and Sergeant Kirk McCormick attended *Patrol Officer Drug Investigations*, Professional Law Enforcement Training.
- ❖ Sergeant Josh Bryant, Detective Sharon Bass and Officer Jared Wood attended *Street Survival Seminar*, Calibre Press.
- ❖ Sergeant Mike Regan, Sergeant Josh Bryant and Sergeant Kirk McCormick attended *Performance Leadership for Public Safety Leaders and Line Staff*.
- ❖ Chief Wyn Lohner attended a League of Oregon Cities Leadership Conference regarding successful council, manager and staff relations.
- ❖ Officer Gerrit Southard attended *Finding Concealed Compartments: Criminal Concealment Techniques* training sponsored by the Drug Enforcement Administration.
- ❖ Chief Wyn Lohner, Sergeant Mike Regan and Sergeant Josh Bryant attended the *Ethical Leadership in Politically Correct Times* Seminar. This training was developed and taught by Reserve Commander Jerry Boyd.
- ❖ Detective Craig Davidson and Officer Jay Lohner attended *Oregon Child Forensic Interview* training. This was a 3-day, 32-hour intensive training in which attendees were required to complete all tests and quizzes with a better than 85% test average in addition to conducting practice interviews.
- ❖ Reserve Officers Daniel Batchelor, Coleton Smith and Tyler Thamert completed Traffic Control training taught by Sergeant Kirk McCormick. This training was necessary in facilitating traffic control during community parades and other functions.
- ❖ Sergeant Kirk McCormick attended *Management of Criminal Investigations Units*, R.A. Doran and Associates.
- ❖ Detective Craig Davidson attended the Child Abuse and Family Violence Summit, 2013.
- ❖ Officer Shannon Regan attended the *Reid Technique of Interviewing and Interrogations* training. This training is designed to help develop interview and interrogation techniques for more successful information gathering.
- ❖ Administrative Assistant Phoebe Wachtel attended a Continuing Education Unit Workshop entitled, "2013 LATCH Updates." This training was necessary in order for her to maintain her carseat technician certification.
- ❖ Sergeant Mike Regan, Officer Wayne Chastain and Officer Wayne Bailey attended Basic SWAT School.
- ❖ Administrative Assistant Phoebe Wachtel successfully completed the Secretary of State Corporate Division Notary Public Seminar.
- ❖ Chief Wyn Lohner, Sergeant Kirk McCormick and Detective Craig Davidson attended *Tactical Ethics – Perspectives on Profiling* training.
- ❖ Department staff, including Reserve Officers, completed EVOC (Emergency Vehicle Operators Course) training which took place at the Baker City Municipal Airport.
- ❖ Sergeant Mike Regan completed the Oregon Emergency Management Training, ICS-300 and ICS-400.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE

Crime prevention specialists know that property neglect sends a negative message which perpetuates further decay, lowers property values, and attracts the criminal element. Intervention through partnerships within the community, local law enforcement and fire safety officers, are a golden opportunity to build long-term relationships while educating residents, ensuring property code compliance, and helping individuals in need of assistance. We feel this is especially true today and this is reflected in our vision for code enforcement which is to optimize all available resources in order to foster positive relationships with Baker City's community residents and local businesses.

Code Enforcement Goals for 2013

- ⊙ Continue to follow up on existing property maintenance investigations.
- ⊙ Address current property maintenance issues and prioritize by severity.
- ⊙ Coordinate with COP volunteers to assist with weed ordinance enforcement.
- ⊙ Other areas of focus:
 - Remove yard sale signs that are illegally placed.
 - Proactively address bicycles/skateboards on Main Street and 1st Street where they are prohibited.
 - Proactively address items on sale on city streets that are prohibited, such as firewood for sale.

ANIMAL CONTROL

- 🐕 **26 Dog at Large citations** were issued.
- 🐕 **2 Allowing a Dog to be a Nuisance citations** were issued.
- 🐕 **56 No Dog License citations** were issued, an 89% increase from 2012.
- 🐕 **27 Other Animal Violations** were issued.
- 🐕 **650 dogs** were licensed city wide for the 2013 calendar year. In addition, 72 dogs were licensed thru 2014 and 43 dogs were licensed thru 2015. This was the first year that residents could purchase multi-year licenses.
- 🐕 **159 dogs were impounded**, a 21% increase in dogs impounded over last year. Of the dogs impounded in 2013, 69% were claimed by an owner; 29% were adopted out; and 2% were euthanized as they were not adoptable or not claimed by an owner. 4 dogs impounded were required to be held on a rabies hold.
- 🐕 **3 livestock permits and 6 kennel permits** were issued.

WEED ABATEMENT

99 complaints of weed abatement were addressed during 2013, with 89 of the complaints coming into compliance upon receipt of written notification from BCPD. The remaining 10 non-compliant complaints were hired out to local contractors by Baker City at the expense of the property owner and/or received a citation for failure to comply.

SPECIAL EVENTS AND

Going beyond the core function of a police department takes forward thinking, dedication and a sincere desire to raise the standard in your department and make your community a better place to live.

The Baker City Police

Department's progressive nature fosters an atmosphere to encourage positive changes.

Looking back on 2013, we were able to accomplish many achievements to aid in the development of our department and enhance the safety and livability in our community.

Some of the events and functions our staff

- BCPD assisted with preplanning for 100th Anniversary of the Founding of the Oregon Cattleman Association Celebration which included traffic control for the parade associated with this event.
- * BCPD provided extra staffing to assist with safety concerns during the 2013 **Hell's Canyon Rally** (<http://www.hellscanyonrally.com/>). Reserve Officers Tyler Thamert and Coleton Smith assisted sworn Officers, primarily working foot patrol during this event. The rally brought an estimated 3000 -4000 visitors to Baker City during the three-day event.



- * BCPD provided traffic control for the **Baker City Cycling Classic** (www.bakercitycycling.org/BCCC/Home.html). In addition, Department Staff and Citizens On Patrol assisted with the Kids' Bike Rodeo. This "bike course" is designed to assist kiddos with learning the rules of the road and other important bike safety tips. *(This participant completed the course to include stopping, making right and left turns and negotiating "bumps" in the road.)*

- * Several BCPD officers assisted with security and traffic control during the 2013 **Miner's Jubilee Celebration and the Bull and Broncs Beer Garden**.
- * BCPD personnel assisted with traffic control at the 2013 Shrine Parade and with security at the 2013 Shrine football game.
- * Chief Lohner served as the MC during the 2013 National Night Our Celebration held at Geiser Pollman Park in August. In addition to assisting with the organizing of Community Night Out, Administrative Assistant Phoebe Wachtel helped staff the Baker City Rotary booth with Kari Borgen. This booth was devoted to teaching youngsters about bicycle safety .



- * BCPD staff and Reserve Officer Tyler Thamert staffed two National Drug Take Back events, April 27th and October 8th where citizens brought in expired, unused and unwanted prescription drugs for proper disposal. In December, a retired U.S. Postal box was recycled into the **Department's permanent prescription drop box** enabling citizens to be able to discard unwanted prescription drugs seven days a week, 24 hours a day. *(This retired U.S. Postal Box, complete with a new paint job, now serves as the drop box for old, expired or unwanted prescription drugs.)*

* BCPD Administrative Assistant and Carseat Technician, Phoebe Wachtel, participated in two carseat clinics, one held during the Parent Resource Fair at BHS and another held at the Baker Health Department. *(Pictured are local carseat technicians Amanda Smull, Bridget Neff and Phoebe Wachtel inspecting an infant carseat at the carseat clinic held at the Health Department).*

- BCPD personnel and a COP volunteer sold dog licenses to community members at the annual rabies clinic.

- The schedule and planning for the 3rd Annual Eastern Oregon Regional Reserve Academy was finalized. Recruits begin classes January 5, 2013.
- BCPD personnel assisted with the starting of the local Easter Egg Hunt in the Geiser-Pollman park.
- BCPD personnel provided security for U.S. Senator Ron Wyden during a Town Hall meeting.
- BCPD partnered with the Salvation Army and hosted an Angel Tree and a food barrel. The Angel Tree was met with an overwhelming response from the community, making for a brighter Christmas for many Baker City children in need. *(This picture of the Angel Tree was taken just before all the gifts were pickup by Salvation Army volunteers to be distributed to children throughout our community.)*
- BCPD continues to provide carseats to low-income families, purchased with funds from an ODOT grant. During this grant cycle: 39 parents were educated on the proper fit of a carseat and a total of 33 carseats were purchased by citizens. In addition, 4 carseats presented for inspection did not meet standards due to missing labels, expiration of the seat, and/or missing owner's manual.
- BCPD continues to partner with New Hope of Eastern Oregon in administering the Trap-Neuter-Return program in Baker City. Fifteen successful TNR's were completed, attending to approximately 127 animals.



- Due to a reduction in funding, ODOT was no longer able to fund the bicycle helmet program at the Department. In an effort to continue this much needed program, BCPD staff reached out to the local Rotary group for assistance with funding. The Baker City Rotary Club has been instrumental in locating sponsors and providing funding for the bike helmet program and to date, approximately 102 helmets have been given to children who couldn't otherwise afford one. As an extension of this project, all the children who attend Head Start were fitted with a bicycle helmets which they will be able to take home at the conclusion of the school year. *(Liberty is pictured receiving her new bicycle helmet).*

- BCPD Reserve personnel conducted foot patrols during the downtown Trick-or-Treat Event and assisted with traffic control during the Twilight Parade.

INVESTIGATIONS

The community of Baker City is fortunate to harbor a very safe environment, free from many of the daily acts of violence that occur in larger communities and even in many smaller communities throughout our state and nation. However, that does not mean that we are completely void of violent acts, drug abuse or complicated fraud crimes.

Fortunately, our department has two experienced investigators to take the lead, or assist, with the higher level and more problematical crimes that do occur in our community. They also place an emphasis on proactive efforts to reduce drug related crimes, which tears at the heart of most communities.

Our two investigators are active members of the Baker County Major Crime Team, which is called

upon to investigate most major felonies and other cases that require significant manpower throughout Baker County. Along with our detectives, this team is comprised of members of the Oregon State Police and the Baker County **Sheriff's Office**. Many of these same members also work together to form the Baker County Narcotics Enforcement Team, which regularly works together to target drug related crimes in our county and at times throughout our region.

Quality investigations are an expectation of our detectives and their success is clearly evident by **the fact that rarely does a major crime's case** ever go to trial in our community. Guilty plea **agreements with the District Attorney's Office** has become the standard for most of these cases, many resulting in extended prison sentences under ballot Measure 11 guidelines.

STATISTICS

Crime rates for the most part are cyclical and will vary based on numerous factors which relate to demographic and economic factors, but also, the criminal justice systems as a whole. Any breakdown in this system can have a startling impact on the type of crimes a particular community might encounter. An **additional factor in small communities with low crime rates, such as Baker City, is "spree crimes"**. One individual or group, participating in a criminal spree such as multiple burglaries committed in private homes or businesses, can greatly affect the statistics. Notable statistics for 2013 reflect the following increases and/or decreases when compared with 2012:

⇒ **18% increase** in overall citations were written in 2013. Citations issued for non-traffic offenses **increased 37%** for this time period. Citations issued for moving violations **increased 6%** and citations issued for parking violations **increased 39%**.

⇒ Overall arrests reflected a very small increase during the past year. Within this statistic, it was noted that probation violation arrests had **increased by 43%**.


⇒ Traffic related arrests **decreased by 31%** and included within this statistic was a **decrease of 23%** for DUII related offenses.

⇒ **33% increase** in traffic warnings were issued.

⇒ **41% increase** in motor vehicle accidents, not including hit and run. Hit and run incidents remained virtually unchanged for this time period.


